The cities of Sao Paulo and Santos' were reported quiet. The situation in Rio Janeiro however, was declared to be very tense according to these advices. The battleship Minas Geraes started in pursuit of the Sao Paulo but returned to harbor shortly afterwards.

CHINESE GOVT. ABOLISHING SUG-GESTIONS.

PEKING, Nov. 5. A new agreement imposed to-day by the De Facto military Government of Peking, provides that titles be abolished in the household of the deposed Manchu dynasty, and that the Imperial allowance be reduced from \$4,000,000 annually to \$500,000, with certain additional sums for the establishment of factories for Manchu retainers to work in.

Litle more than half the Senate and House contests had been finally reported with results so far showing a net Republican gain of a dozen ro presentatives and probably three or four Senators. The bugaboo of throwing the presidential election into Congress was chased away by ranidity with which large blocks of electoral votes either fell into the Coulidge column or game seemingly unmistakable evidence of going there As returns continued to come in John W. Davis succeeded in capturing the only states generally reckoned irrevocably Democratic. Even at that he lost Kentucky on the face of incomplete returns, although Cox had carried it against Harding in 1920. The same returns indicated he had brought back into the Democratic fold two of the States taken away by Harding-Oklahama and Tennessee. Senator LaFollette, although palling a popular vote of about 470 000, which approximates Rosevelt's total when he led the third Party movement in 1912, was assured the electoral vote of only one state, his own, Wiscensia. Rosevelt captured 88 electoral votes in 1912, fought to defeat his Republican opponent, Taft ,and elect his Democratic adversary, Wilson. It was estimated that Coolidge polled 18,000,-000 popular votes-two mil ion more than were given to Harding. Davis it was estimated had 8,000,000, for 9,-00,000 for Cox.
