By this Pact Germany and France omise not to make war upon one another, and Britain, Italy, and Belgium agree to go to the support of Germany if she is attacked by France, or o the support of France is France is attacked by Germany.

"In these accords," Mr. Chamberlain said, "is sealed our common reconciliation with Germany."
