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ONTARIO ELECTION BILL.

Brought into the Legislature by the Attorney-General.

Mr. Whitney Says It Is His Bill to All Intents and Purposes—The Attorney-General Admits That More Severity Towards Corruptionists in Ontario Is Needed—How It Is Sized Up—Other Bills Advanced.

Toronto, April 18.—Mines and bribes monopolized the attention of the Legislature yesterday.

The Bracebridge and Trading Lake Bay Company bill, the Town of Preston bill and the City of Oshawa bill were read a third time.

The House, in Committee, considered Mr. Davis' bill respecting the manufacturing of spruce and other pulp wood on the Crown domain.

To Give Tourists a Show. Mr. Latchford explained that it might be expedient to modify his Fisheries bill in so far as it prohibits the sale or exportation of trout, bass and maskinonge.

Mr. Davis gave an exhaustive account of his Mines bill. It was not the intention of the Government at the present time to levy any tax, at least for a number of years, although the bill conferred this power on the Government.

Mr. Whitney's Protest. Mr. Whitney asked what is the reason of bringing in hundreds of bills containing provisions which the Government do not intend to put in force?

Mr. Whitney's protest was continued as he introduced his bill to amend the Ontario Election Act. He contended that but little fault had been found with the bill, either by the country or in the press.

Mr. Matheson declared that the whole professed principle underlying the tax on iron was wrong, and the injury done to the province by the Government was greater than any member of the Government had capacity to calculate.

The bill was read a second time. Ontario Election Bill. Attorney-General Gibson moved the second reading of the Government bill to amend the Ontario Election Act.

Mr. Whitney complimented the Attorney-General on the sincere tone of his remarks. For years he (Mr. Whitney) had attempted to grapple with this question, but Mr. Gibson had year after year opposed his demand for imprisonment of election offenders.

Mr. Whitney mentioned that he had proposed the trial of offenders by jury, which Mr. Gibson had also opposed. However, it was his belief now that the people of Ontario would be better satisfied with trial by the election courts without the intervention of a jury.

The Attorney-General has now developed a strong inclination to severity and in that direction the Opposition would go as far with him as he could desire.

Mr. Whitney added: "Every section of the Attorney-General's bill, with two or three exceptions, is founded on mine, and in many cases an exact transcript has been made of my clauses."

Mr. Whitney then went on to make comparisons of the two bills, clause by clause. The bill was read a second time.

The House remained in supply up to the hour of adjournment at 11 o'clock.

Point Pelee Lighthouse Burned. Leamington, Ont., April 18.—The Government dummy lighthouse at Point Pelee was destroyed by fire about 11.30 yesterday, while blowing in the fog horn.

W. A. Grubb, jr., lightkeeper, was seriously burned, but will recover. The dummy was completely destroyed, and the loss will be heavy.

French Captured English Yacht. Paris, April 18.—La Patrie reports the capture of an English yacht that was spying in the neighborhood of Toulon.
