

Reeking Rottenness.

Further Evidences of Deep-Seated Corruption.

Brought to Light by the Committees at Ottawa.

Robert McGreevy's Clear-Cut Statement of the "Shady" Transactions.

Sir Hector's Implication in the Booming Business Fully Substantiated.

Ascending Admissions Made by the Secretary of the Interior Department.

OTTAWA, July 24.—Yesterday Robert McGreevy corroborated Murphy's story that Nicholas Langvin had paid him \$10,000 to secure the election of Sir Hector. Robert said that in the spring of 1887, they had just paid \$27,000 for political bonds, and the announcement that Nicholas had contributed \$10,000 more led him to speak to that person on the subject. Nicholas said that he could not help it—that young Langvin had come with a note or message from his father and that it was important that the money should be given. Robert thereupon replied that it had better be changed to the Equitable Bank than to the Quebec Bank. The point of this was that Robert had a 30 per cent. interest in the Quebec Bank and only a 20 per cent. interest in the Equitable Bank. Robert said that the \$10,000 was charged to the latter bank and would save just as much. Murphy gave a similar account of the matter. Nicholas told him about the \$10,000 payment to Sir Hector, and he reported the matter to Uncle Thomas, who flew into a passion. Nicholas said young Langvin came with a note from his father and he gave \$5,000 to Sir Hector himself. Nicholas denied the whole thing before the committee, but it will be remembered that his recollection was dreadfully poor all through.

OPEN CONFESSION.
Before the Public Accounts Committee the Secretary of the Interior Department, Mr. John Hall, who is frequently acting deputy, admitted what Mr. Somerville had already established by sworn testimony, that he was aware of the payments of money under false names; that it was a regular practice to his knowledge since 1883, and that it was sanctioned by the department as a regular thing in the case of at least three permanent clerks. One drew money in the maiden name of his mother, another in the name of a sister-in-law, and a third in the name of a person who had no existence save on the face of the official check. Messrs. Rogers and Kinloch were permanent clerks. One received a regular salary of \$1,500, and the other \$1,400. Mr. Rogers drew money in the name of his sister-in-law, and the other in the name of a friend who held a high position in another branch of the civil service. Still another fresh case was that of Mr. Brough, who drew money in his name with the express permission of the secretary of the department. Another case which the secretary informed the committee of was that of Mr. Loyer, who regularly drew money in the name of M. E. Charbonneau. There are other disclosures. The fact is now established that the system was approved by the deputy minister and the secretary of the department, who knowingly allowed the law.

DAMAGING EVIDENCE CONTINUED.
Robert McGreevy threw a great deal of fresh light on the shady proceedings of the Quebec and British Columbia. He corroborated Murphy's testimony down to the minutest detail, was able to explain the object of every act, the meaning of every subtle phrase, and the meaning of every correspondence about which he was questioned.

A CRUISEL.
Once Mr. Hector Cameron, the faithful old Tory who watches Captain Larkin's interest, thought he caught the witness tripping. Mr. McGreevy produced a letter dated April 28, 1889, that he wrote to Larkin complaining of the improper and irregular payments made by the firm to Government inspectors and others. Up jumped Mr. Cameron to gleefully announce that Capt. Larkin had severed his connection with the firm when the letter was written. "Well," remarked the imperturbable witness, "if he had left it I was not aware of the fact. I was talking to Mr. Larkin about the affairs of the firm three months before the letter was written. Mr. Cameron looked skeptical. Sir John Thompson chuckled. The witness gave utterance to a chilling remark on the funny count. "If an under oath here," he said, "and you are not. I will submit to none of your insinuations." Mr. Cameron was crushed.

A STARTLER.
Mr. McGreevy's testimony was mainly valuable for its splendid elucidation of the documents filed and its corroboration of previous witnesses. But there was one fact—a new and important fact—which rather startled the Perley apologists on the committee. It was this: The witness declared that Michael Connolly received from the firm \$2,000, made up of five \$400 notes, and, with a purpose like Mr. Larkin's, went to Ottawa to tempt the chief engineer. When he went back he reported that he could not find Perley, but he gave the money to him. It is worth while remembering that young Perley is the Government engineer of the Kingston graving dock, and must have been aware through the of the Boncroft and no doubt an active co-operator in securing the alterations in the dock, which raised the price by nearly \$250,000.

An attempt was made to show that Thomas McGreevy had supported the Mercier Government in recent elections, but that was shown to be a lie; that he had opposed his brother Robert when he was Conservative candidate for the Legislature for one of the Quebec seats, and this was

was but a development of the family quarrels.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

A Spectacle Not Seen for Many Years in Parliament.

THE LABORED ARGUMENTS OF A CONSERVATIVE MEMBER COMPELS EVERY CABINET MINISTER TO VACATE HIS SEAT IN THE HOUSE.

OTTAWA, July 24.—The House went on at once to-day with the budget debate, which was resumed by Mr. Kenny, Conservative member for Halifax. He sounded the praises of Mr. Forster, and in flowery language declared that the refrain of the budget speech was taken up in every Province and found a welcome in every home. Mr. Kenny strongly advocated a system of railway subsidies and the extension of the Grand Trunk Railway to the Maritime Provinces. The honorable gentleman spoke slightly of the trade policy of the Opposition and hopefully of the condition of trade and the autumn prospects. Mr. Kenny is noted for his long-winded speeches, and after he had held forth for two hours he had succeeded in decimating the House, and for the first time in many years there was not a member of the Cabinet in his seat. So disheartening was this that Mr. Kenny sat down as soon as he observed the absence of all his leaders.

Mr. Fraser followed and took Mr. Kenny, a member, sharply to task for dabbling in those who opposed money and disloyal citizens. Expanding into the merits of the arguments for protection, Mr. Fraser entered into the question of protection versus free trade, and read the honorable gentleman's lecture on primary principles for the Ministerialists, he declared, were burdened with more unadvised ignorance than almost anyone else as to political economy. The honorable gentleman declared that he preferred an artifice of birth to a phytocracy of wealth. He has been long enough to render it probable that he will ever reappear as a Minister. Unless he improves he will withdraw from public life.

SEVEN CHILDREN DROWNED.

Shocking Catastrophe on the Lower St. Lawrence—An Unidentified Body Found.

QUEBEC, July 25.—A vague dispatch received from Seven Islands, on the Lower St. Lawrence, reports the drowning of seven children—Alfred, Joseph, Marie, Louis and Cecile, the boys and Marguerite and Marguerite. Details of the catastrophe have not yet been received, but it is announced that a little boy, only 7 years old, who was in the party, showed extraordinary courage, and was rescued, having one of his companions, a little girl 8 years old. Five of the bodies have been recovered, and the search for the others is being prosecuted.

PORT CAROLINE, Ont., July 25.—Two men working on the beach about seven miles east of here, discovered a body in the water, and secured it. It seemed to be a child, but it might be either Major Ryerson's or Mr. Barker's, who were lost with the yacht Mabel near Long Point on the 3rd of July, but this supposition proved incorrect. The body is that of a man about 30 years of age, light hair, small mustache and a thick head of hair. The left eye is cut under the lid. It is dressed in a black shirt, no vest, dark striped trousers, black shooting jacket with lining frayed, heavy rolled lace shoes and straw hat, \$5.00 in money, a knife with a blue handle, a wooden handle were found in the pockets of the trousers. Deceased wore a brass. A clinker boat came ashore on July 17, marked "Yacht P. D. W." A fishing spoon marked "Five Crows & Son, Toronto," was found in the boat.

Death of Dr. Tye.
CHATHAM, July 24.—Dr. George A. Tye, one of the ablest physicians in Canada, died yesterday. He was an ex-president of the Medical Association of Ontario and a delegate to the World's Medical Conference at Washington, D. C., in 1888.

The Tide of Liberalism Gathering Force.

A Grand Victory Gained in North Cambridgehire.

The Constituency Redeemed—Election of Brand, the Gladstonian Candidate.

LONDON, July 24.—The election yesterday in the north or Wisbech division of Cambridgehire for a successor in Parliament to the late C. W. Selwyn (Conservative) resulted in another victory for the Liberal.

The result was Arthur Brand (Lib.), 3,979; Duncan (Con.), 3,719.

At the last election Selwyn received 4,169 votes, to 2,682 for Gladstonian. This transforms a Tory majority of 2,087 into a Liberal majority of 260.

LONDON, July 25.—The Liberal victory in the Wisbech division was opposed by powerful local trade interests, and it was hardly calculated that he would do any more than reduce the Conservative majority dominant in the constituency. These were thrown in their full strength against the Gladstonian, whose victory is therefore all the more significant.

But neither this nor the results of any of the bye-elections will alter the determination of the Government to try to complete its scheme of Irish legislation before the dissolution of Parliament. Certain influential Conservatives in constant communication with the electoral headquarters are pressing Lord Salisbury to remodel the Cabinet and to dissolve at once. They plead that the strength of the Gladstonian reaction is growing constantly and that another year's delay will probably result in an overwhelming Liberal majority.

The talk over the Wisbech election in the Conservative and Liberal circles treat it as likely to precipitate the dissolution of Parliament. The former are, however, deriding the notion that a bye-election will change the line decided upon. The period for the reconstruction of the Cabinet depends upon the result of the election. He has been long enough to render it probable that he will ever reappear as a Minister. Unless he improves he will withdraw from public life.

It is reported that Judge Chadwick will be appointed senior judge of Wellington county.

Michael Bowes, of Bathurst township, was instantly killed by lightning Thursday.

A case of malpractice on Alice Mender, who formerly lived in Woodstock, is reported from Montreal.

The brigantine Alago First (Capt. Hire), owned by Thos. Forhand & Co., of Halifax, has been totally wrecked at Azores. The crew were saved.

The creditors of McLean, Shaw & Co., the insolvent wholesale hat and cap firm, Montreal, have decided to wind up the estate. The stock is valued at \$25,000.

Alex. Johnson, jun., age 28 or 30, who lives near Strathline, has been expelled from the Hamilton Presbytery, for the seduction of his sister-in-law, Miss Lottian, a girl of 17 years.

Dr. Wells, one of Montreal's most popular preachers, has received a call from the Plymouth Congregational Church, of Minneapolis, which offers him \$5,000 a year to become its pastor.

A marble dealer named Frank Gottorf was before the Hamilton police magistrato yesterday, on the charge of removing tombstones from the cemetery, professed by J. Diamond. Gottorf said the understanding was that if he did not get his pay for the tombstones within three months after the sale he could remove them. The magistrate dismissed the case.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The Education Bill passed its third reading in the British House of Lords yesterday.

The Imperial Bank of Melbourne has suspended with liabilities of £150,000. The depositors, it is said, will be paid in full.

London cable says that the judgment of the Privy Council in the Bishop of Lincoln's case is not likely to be rendered before November.

An excursion steamer from Cuxhaven has been wrecked near Zinnovitz. All passengers were saved but the cook and stewardess, and the latter's daughter, who were drowned.

The Naval Estimates Committee of the French Chamber of Deputies has approved a scheme for placing torpedoes in all the principal ports of France, and greatly increasing the squadrons in some waters.

The Queen, distressed by the accounts of the suffering of cattle on the Atlantic voyage, has sent an intimation to Mr. Chaplin, president of the Board of Agriculture, to make the proposed regulations effective.

There has been an increase in the area of the flooded districts in Moravia and Silesia. The Vistula and the March near Otmutz are a mile wide and much land is submerged. In the Tyrol Alps large tracts of land have been devastated by avalanches.

Sigmar Crispien has an article in the Contemporary Review, in which he defends Italy against the attacks of the French press. He says France lost in late years opposed any reconciliation between the Papacy and the Italian Government. One of the causes of Italy's adhesion to the Triple Alliance was the guarantee of obtaining a guarantee against the claims of the Pope, and giving the country assurance that France would not again send expeditions to support the Pope's claims.

UNITED STATES.

Vice-President Levy of the Jewish Alliance of America has given \$1,000 towards each of the imported Russian Jews detained at New York, and the party has been released.

The United States bulletin relating to copper production in the United States shows the United States to be the largest producer of copper in the world, its product for 1889 being 235,655,962 pounds.

The Columbia Oil Company, dealers in cotton seed and oil, with offices in Chicago, London, Memphis and Ottawa, Minn., was placed in the hands of a receiver yesterday. Liabilities, \$500,000.

At the annual meeting of the Maine Pharmaceutical Association, President C. K. Partridge declared that the prohibition law of that State has, after nearly half a century's trial, proved a "moral, political, and semi-religious fraud."

It was stated at the internal revenue office, Chicago, yesterday that the whisky trust has decided to concentrate the whisky producing interests of the west at the headquarters of the trust in Pocatello, Id. The object of this move, it is asserted, is economy in operation.

A Knoxville special says: Large quantities of rifles and arms are going to the miners. The delay has given the miners much encouragement, and they now say they will fight. The President may have to send aid, as the State is threatened with invasion from Kentucky.

Closing Session of the Grand Lodge.

London Chosen as the Next Place of Meeting.

Numerous Proposed Changes Voted—Election of Grand Lodge Officers and D. D. G. M.

TORONTO, July 24.—The first business at the meeting of the Grand Lodge of Ontario in the Opera House yesterday morning was the reception of the report of the Committee on Credentials. It showed that there were on the register 351 subordinates, of which 224 were represented by their qualified officers and 80 by proxy. There were 47 lodges unrepresented.

On the roll were the names of 749 craftsmen present, giving a total vote of 1,353, the largest ever polled by the Grand Lodge.

A motion by W. Bro. Malcolm Gibbs, to prohibit the use of spirituous liquors as a beverage at all refreshment tables in connection with Masonic lodges, created a long and interesting discussion. The vote stood 404 for and 616 against.

A motion by W. Bro. A. H. Collins, to include a grand lecture among the officers of the Grand Lodge was voted down.

A motion by W. Bro. E. H. D. Hall was as follows: "That the members of the Board of General Purposes be not paid their mileage and per diem expenses for attendance at any regular meeting of the Board, and that the constitution be amended accordingly." Deferred.

Three motions by W. Bro. E. T. Malone were defeated on a division. The first was intended to provide for clothing to be worn at Masonic funerals; the second called for an examination by the D. D. G. M. in person or by proxy of every master-elect, and the third sought to compel every newly-elected W. M. before installation to present a certificate of qualification from the D. D. G. M. of his district.

A motion by W. Bro. Fred F. Manley to prohibit any brother from being longed to more than one private lodge except where honorary membership or life membership gives him the privilege; R. W. Bro. J. A. Willis motion providing specific hours for the district to meet, and a resolution by R. W. Bro. A. McGinnis to alter the date of meeting of the Grand Lodge from the third Wednesday in July to the second Tuesday in June, were each defeated.

W. Bro. C. C. Robinson made the following motion: "That hereafter all business transacted in a warranted lodge, except initiating and passing, shall be conducted in the third degree. The motion was lost, 443 for and 616 against.

A motion that the centennial of Freemasonry in Canada be commemorated by permitting every member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues prior to Jan. 1, 1890, to be restored without any payment of arrears and by payment of one year's dues in advance to the lodge from which he had been suspended was laid over for future consideration.

Another motion by C. C. Robinson to abolish life membership was defeated.

A motion that clause No. 136 of the book of constitution be amended so that the clause will read "twenty-five" instead of "twenty" dollars for initiation was lost.

A resolution by Bro. A. McGinnis, of Belleville, to alter the date of the meeting of Grand Lodge by changing the words "third Wednesday in July" to "the second Tuesday in June" was defeated.

The election of officers resulted as follows: Grand master, J. Ross Robertson, Toronto (re-elected); deputy grand master, Hon. J. M. Gibson, Hamilton (re-elected); press, W. E. The drinking fountain question was laid over until next meeting. The engineer stated that one of the old ones was broken and another missing.

The petition of Dr. Fenwick, et al., for connection with the Richmond street sewer was referred back to the solicitor to throw light on some technicality.

The County Council offered the use of a portion of the court house square to the city for park purposes. The letter was ordered to be acknowledged.

Another communication from the county stated in event of the city refusing to put another story on the jail the commissioners would proceed with the construction of a new roof.

Ald. O'Meara said he would go in for taking a story off the jail rather than adding one. "If whiskey was banished from this city we wouldn't need to spend so much on the jail," said he.

Ald. Winnett—I agree with you there.

Ald. O'Meara, continuing—You can go to the Police Court every morning and see a half a dozen hummers sent down for us to keep. You will find that nine-tenths of the other crimes for which people are in jail are due to whiskey.

"Them's my sentiments," re-echoed Ald. Winnett.
