for in a cash collection on Nov. 1. "One
thousand dollars or nothing," was his terse

gave cheerfully and freely. The plates
literally overflowed with the burden of
\$1,123.87, undoubtedly the largest cash
collection ever taken in the village.

tangible gifts, which were quite numerous
and costly.

FENT.

The surveyors who are striking out the
line for the proposed extension of the L. E.
and D. R. Railway have reached Elgin,
Ont., striking to the north of the village.
If proper inducements are held out the
road will be built in the spring.

Knight vs. Town of Ridgeway; Watson
vs. Town of Ridgeway;—W. M. Douglas,
for the plaintiffs, appealed from the tax-
ation of the costs of the defendants the
Town of Ridgeway by the master at Chat-
ham in actions for damages for injuries to
the plaintiffs' lands by reason of a railway
track having been built in the neighbor-
hood. The defendants the Town of Ridgeway
brought in the Canada Southern
Railway Company and the Municipality as de-
fendants under the Municipal Act, and
claimed relief over against them. By the
judgment the action was dismissed with
costs to be paid by the plaintiffs to the de-
fendants the Town of Ridgeway, and the
claim for relief over against them was dis-
missed. The plaintiffs now appeal on the
ground that the master should not have al-
lowed the defendants the Town of Ridgeway
to sue, as against the plaintiffs, the costs
incurred with respect to the added defend-
ants. Appeal allowed with costs on the
ground that under the judgment the de-
fendants the Town of Ridgeway are not
entitled to the costs in question.
