NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—Wm. Whitton,
president of the Mutual Benefit Life Associ-
ation, admitted today that the association
was insolvent, and that it was going to re-
insure its members in another company.
"Our members will not lose anything," he
said. "They will all be insured in a
stronger company. We have not written
any policies since last month. We ceased
to do business then."

Will Take Canadian Names.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 9.—Immigration
Commissioner McGlone has been instructed
to make the same inspection of immigrants
from Canada as is done in the case of those
entered by port of New York. This in-
cludes the taking of names of all immi-
grants and destination to assist him in the
matter of detecting imported labor under
contract.

He Doesn't Want Much.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—Charles E. Bolles,
a Brooklyn photographer, has sued the
publishers of the New York World for
\$217,000, for infringement of copyrights.
He says in the complaint that he copy-
righted on June 20, 1893, a photograph of
the sloop yacht Colonia, taken in the
water of Narragansett Bay, and the de-
fendants, without his consent, produced
this photograph.

—Mr. Joseph Paladino has left to resume
the trusteeship of the Lyceum Theater
in Detroit.

—Miss B. Robinson, of St. Catharines,
is relieving the G. T. R. station ticket
agent here.

—Traffic across the bridge at Byron has
been stopped. Extensive repairs to the
structure will be made.

—Mr. T. D. Norton, near Nilestown,
who has been ill for the past two weeks, is
now rapidly convalescing.

—There's lots more rain to come down
yet. It was held up so long that the
cloud-cisterns must be full.

—Herrington, the alleged Strathroy fire-
bug, elected trial by jury Saturday, and
was committed to the jail.

—The condition of Mr. Jesse M.
Symonds, of the ADVERTISER, remains un-
changed. His case is still very critical.

—Mr. Chas. E. Trebilcock and Mr. John
Kennedy leave for Toronto today as West-
ern Fair representatives at the Industrial
Fair.

—St. John's Lodge, No. 209, A. F. and
A. M., may pay a fraternal visit to St.
Thomas Lodge at their regular meeting on
Oct. 4.

—The recent rains have caused a rise in
the reservoir water owing to the non-
sprinkling of roads and lawns. As much
water is used in summer for these purposes
as is required for all others combined.

—Whitney Bullied was brought before
Judge Edward Elliott Saturday. He has
been in jail some time on a warrant of
arrest to keep the peace. Bullied was unable
to furnish the necessary bonds, and was re-
manded till Monday, when his wife will be
present.

—At the last meeting of Hamilton Camp,
Woodman of the past, there was read a
very cordial letter from W. C. Fitzgerald,
head clerk, inviting all Woodmen who at-
tended the Western Fair, London, to
call at the Woodmen's Temple, which was
erected on the fair grounds.

—Messrs. R. W. Rennie (regent), S. W.
Fawcett (secretary) and J. Macpherson
(treasurer) of the London South Council,
(treasurer) of the Royal Avonmouth, have pre-
sented Mrs. Jane Deacon, widow of the
late Joseph S. Deacon, with a check for
\$3,000, the amount of Mr. Deacon's benefit
certificate.

—The Winnipeg Tribune, referring to
the great mass meeting in honor of Hon.
Wilfrid Laurier in that city, refers to the
member-elect for this city: "Mr. Hyatt,
who should be the member for London but
for the act of a bad Tory Judge," as Mr.
Fraser so aptly puts it, made an excellent
impression. He is one of the most popular
men in the ranks of the Liberal party."

—Harry Dean, a young London township
boy, was tried by Squire Lacey on Satur-
day on a charge of having stolen some
articles from John Coote, Oxford street.
Dean was at the Coote fire, and papers, a
wrench, auger, and a pair of pliers, a
country constable, in his way and
Dean was arrested, but was afterwards
bailed. The goods were of no value and
the case was dismissed.

—Mr. E. J. Bennett arrived home with
his wife from the London hospital Wednes-
day of last week, about three weeks after
the operation for the removal of a tumor
performed by Dr. Eccles, of that city. Mrs.
Bennett, owing to her previous favorable
physical condition, has recovered from the
operation, and is now in a fair way to ultimate
recovery. —[Petrolia Topic.]

—Headmaster Liddicott, of the London
West school, reported to the village Board
of Education on Friday night that the
number of pupils on the roll during August
was 310. The daily average attendance
was 310. The school will close one day
next week to allow the children to attend
the fair. Tenders will be called for 30 tons
of coal—20 of grate and 10 of soft—and a
special meeting will be held to award the
contract. Trustees Brown (chairman),
Houghton (secretary), L. V. Ludwig, Ed.
Pudney and Headmaster Liddicott were
present.

—"A Cracker Jack," a melodrama
typical of wild and joyous western life,
was put on the boards of the Grand on Sat-
urday night before a top-heavy house. The
"gods" were especially demonstrative in
their applause whenever the hero
scored a stroke and hissed "vigorously"
on every appearance of the heavy
villain. The performance was good
of its kind. George B. Miller, the
hero, and Frederick A. Sullivan as the
villain, did some clever acting. Carrie
Ezler and Fannie Frantzel divided the
honors in the feminine roles.

A Touching Tribute.

A contingent of the deputation of the
Newfoundland Conference visited Mount
Pleasant Cemetery Saturday afternoon and
placed a beautiful wreath of rare flowers on
the grave of Rev. George Boyd, formerly of
St. John's, Nfld., as a tribute of regard. A
short memorial service was held, in which
the Rev. Dr. Milligan, Hon. J. J. Rogerson
and others took part.

Crushed by a Horse.

Mr. Wilberforce Marshall, a well-known
bank clerk and member of the London
Hunt, went out for a ride on Saturday
afternoon. At the corner of Richmond and
Victoria streets the horse stumbled and
fell and rolled on in two places. He was re-
moved to St. Joseph's Hospital, where the
limb was set. The patient is doing well.

Burn Burned.

A fire, supposedly of incendiary origin,
almost completely destroyed a large frame
barn yesterday morning, the property of
Mr. Thomas Morkin, Richmond street. It
was noticed between 3 and 4 o'clock, and
although the firemen made quick time the
fire burnt fiercely and caused great excite-
ment in the comparatively crowded neigh-
borhood in which it occurred.

Mr. Morkin's many friends will be pleased to
learn that the celebrated horse "Barney,"
"Annie Rooney" and the baby were grazing
peacefully in pasture at the time. The
damage to the building will amount to \$400,
and the loss is fully covered by insurance.
It is thought that tramps caused the blaze.

Eclipse of the Moon.

A partial eclipse of the moon will occur
on Friday night next. It will be visible
throughout North and South America. The
beginning will be visible in the western
part of Europe and Africa. The observer
will see the shadow first at the north point
of the moon's disk. As the moon moves up
toward the left, the shadow will appear to
move down toward the right, covering at
the middle of the eclipse a little less than a
quarter of the diameter of the moon's disk,
and leaving it at a point 68° to the west
from the north point. The first contact
will occur at 9h 30m, central standard
time. Before this a faint shading, due to
the penumbra of the earth's shadow, will
have been noticed on the upper part of
the disk. At 10h 32m the eclipse will be at
its maximum. After that there will be only
the faint penumbral shading on the west
side of the disk.

Distinguished Visitors Preach.

At Queen's Avenue Church yesterday
morning the sermon was preached by Rev.
H. J. Pope, the English representative of
Wesleyan Methodism. The church had
been tastefully decorated with flowers, and
the musical service was grand. A number
of visiting clergymen were present, and
among them were Rev. Dr. Potts
(Toronto), Rev. Dr. Sutherland, Rev. Dr.
McDonald, Rev. Dr. Dowart, Rev. Dr.
Hunter, Rev. Dr. Burwash, Rev. Dr. Mil-
lingan and Rev. Dr. Sanderson and the pastor,
Rev. J. W. Annis. The text was taken
from the 23rd verse of the first chapter of
Paul's Epistle to the Philippians, and was
the subject of Mr. Pope's remarks was "Con-
version." He argued that it was of
more importance to be sure one was
converted than to be able to be precise
as to the moment the conversion
occurred. Mr. J. W. Fetherston
opened the musical service with an anthem
from "Gloria" (Haydn). The anthem was
sung from Haydn's "Messiah," in
which the solo part was taken by Miss
Tillie Barnard in a beautiful contralto
voice. A quartette rendered "Rock of
Ages" (Bundley Buckle) in a very impressive
manner. The singers were Miss Birdie
Land, Miss Laurina Hartson, Mr. Thomas
Norman, and Mr. A. T. Stockwell. Mr.
Fetherston's closing overture was from
Verdi's "Nabuccadnezzar." The organist
was assisted by Mr. Thomas McCormick,
cornet, and Mr. Fred Howell, bass horn.

In the evening the platform was again
filled with visitors, and Rev. J. H. Fether-
ston, Detroit, preached an excellent and scholarly
discourse. The attendance was very large,
and, as in the morning, the musical service
was a special feature. The sermon was an
appropriate Methodist one on the life of
Christ. The text was taken from Colos-
sians, i. 28. The anthem was from Gaul's
"Halleluia." Miss Laurina Hartson in a
very charming manner sang a singularly
difficult solo, "Hear Ye, Hear Ye." The closing
selection was Costa's "Triumphal
March."
