Eclipse of the Moon. A partial eclipse of the moon will occur on Friday night next. It will be visible throughout North and South America. The beginning will be visible in the western part of Europe and Africa. The observer will see the shadow first at the north point of the moon's disk. As the moon moves up toward the left, the shadow will appear to move down toward the right, covering at the middle of the eclipse a little less than a quarter of the diameter of the moon's disk, and leaving it at a point 58° to the west from the north point. The first contact will occur at 9h 36m, central standard time. Before this a faint shading, due to the pneumbra of the earth's shadow. will have been noticed on the upper part of the disk. At 10h 32m the eclipse will be at its maximum. After that there will be only the faint penumbral shading on the west side of the disk.
