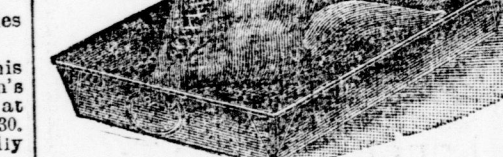

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

across the border.—Mayor Ebery is down east and Ald.
Coo is acting mayor.—W. R. Callaway, district passenger
agent C. P. R., is in town.—Miss Josephine Morden, of Ridgeway,
is visiting her aunt, Mrs. Morden, Stanley
street, South London.—A Montreal dispatch says: "Miss M.
E. Findlay, B.A., of London University,
was tonight appointed lady principal of
the high school."—A number of citizens have been invited
to witness the laying of the corner stone of
the new pump house at Springbank on
Friday afternoon.—Messrs. A. C. and A. R. Baker, sons of
C. Baker, nurseryman, left last night for
Montreal, whence they sail by steamer
Texas to Bristol to visit their grandfather
and other friends.—The steamer Aurora arrived at Port
Stanley Monday from George's Bay with
200,000 feet of lumber and lath for Mr.
Frank Shepherd. This is one of the largest
cargoes ever landed at Port.—A society journal of Toronto says:
"Mrs. T. F. Howe, of London, Ont., has
engaged W. G. Matthews' cottage at Gan-
aque to July 1, and will with her family
enjoy the summer breezes of Trenton
Park."—The Bowmanville Sun, referring to the
candidature of Mr. Thos. S. Hobbs in this
city, says: "He is a young energetic busi-
ness man, has a clean record, and his
candidature is endorsed by the best men in
the Forest City. We hope he will win."—The remains of Mr. and Mrs. S. J.
Zealand and child, who lost their lives in
the collision at the L. and P. S. R. and M.
C. R. crossings at St. Thomas on July 15,
1887, and were interred in the St. Thomas
cemetery, were yesterday exhumed, taken
to Brantford and reinterred.—The annual lecture of the Montreal
branch of the Theological Union was de-
livered last night at Kingston by Rev. A.
C. Courtice, M.A., B.D., of Montreal,
formerly of London. The subject of the
lecture was "Anthropology Underlying
Redemption." The paper was a very
able one.

The International Whitman Society.

The New York Sun says: "A conference

week for the purpose of completing the
organization of the International Whitman
Society, which was projected some years
ago. It will be attended by people from
various States of the Union, from Canada,
and from other parts of the world. The
conference is to be held on the birthday of
Mr. Whitman."

Manager Whitney's Latest.

C. J. Whitney, says the Detroit News,
has about twenty shiners on his hands and
wants to branch out more extensively in the
music business, so he has sold his new
eight-story Whitney Opera House block and
theater on Griswold street to Stephen
Baldwin for \$300,000 cash. Mr. Whitney
bought the ground in 1887 and erected the
building at a cost of \$150,000. Of course
the erection of the Whitney Opera House

May's Unprecedented Rainfall.

The total rainfall during the past month
has been the largest on record for the month
of May. The depth now stands at 8.71
inches, and there is a possibility of this
being increased. On 19 days of the past 28
rain fell, but on the 19th, 20th and 21st the
downfall was heaviest, 1.22 falling on the
19th, 1.86 on the 20th and 2.09 on the 21st.
In previous May's the records show that the
nearest approach to this deluge was in
1888, when 7.67 inches fell. Last year the
fall during May was 3.86 inches, spread
over 18 days. The average rainfall for 54
years for this month has been 2.93 inches.

Meeting of Number Three.

At last night's meeting of No. 3 com-
mittee the street watering inspector, Mr.
Isaac, reported that Contractor Baldwin
was again performing the work in a care-
less and unsatisfactory manner. Engineer
Graydon reported that he had written to
Mr. Baldwin about the matter, but the
latter had not taken any notice. It was
decided to notify Mr. Baldwin's sureties
that unless the specifications were carried
out the contract will be annulled and the
bond forfeited. The committee will meet
early on Monday night and make a recom-
mendation to the council. Mr. Isaac

Independent Legislative Clubs affiliated
with this council, did publicly pledge him-
self to do all in his power to return Mr.
Meredith to the Local Legislature;

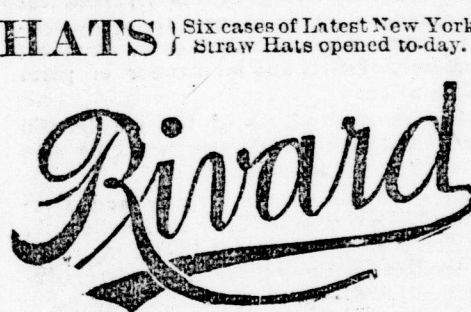

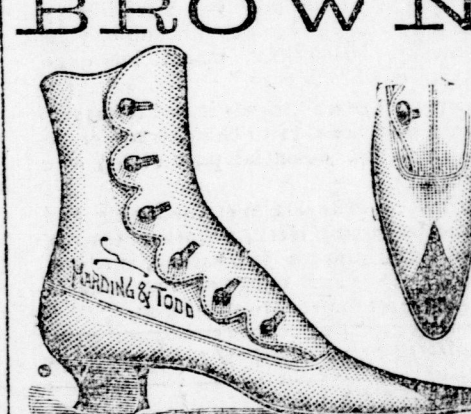
