Spain Ready To Quit Fighting.

Would Accept Almost Any Peace Proposal, Provided It Does Not Emancipate From the Enemy.

Insurgents Say 110 Dons Were Killed in the Cars

When the Gunboat Dolphin Shelled a Railway Train.

Three Spanish Ironclads Said to Have Penetrated to Manila Harbor—Dewey Ready to 'Do Them—Spaniards Attack the U. S. Marines at Guantanamo.

READY FOR THEM. London, June 14.—According to a dispatch from Madrid to the Financial News, three Spanish ironclads from Madagascar waters have arrived inside of Manila harbor, and Admiral Dewey's ships have gone to meet them.

SPAIN WANTS PEACE. Brussels, June 14.—A special Madrid correspondent of the Petit Bleu of this city has telegraphed an interview which he claims to have had with Senor Merino, the private secretary of the Spanish premier, Senor Sagasta, in which the secretary is quoted as having formally declared that the Spanish Government will now accept any peace proposal which shall be submitted on the express condition that it does not emanate from the enemy, but the premier's secretary is said to have added "the international mediation which would be especially welcomed on the part of Spain would be in the case of the initiative being taken by France or Austria."

KILLED 110 DONS.

New York, June 14.—A special dispatch from Santiago, by way of Port Antonio, says that insurgent forces have confirmed the report that shells from the Dolphin struck a train loaded with Spanish soldiers. They say 110 men were killed. The train made a run for the shelter of some woods, but was unable to make it. The Dolphin was within rifle range, and riddled the train with her machine guns. 3,000 GERMAN MARINES AT MANILA.

London, June 14.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times remarks that the fact that "twelve four-warships already at Cavite and with the Darmstadt on the way with 1,400 men, Germany will have a force of 3,000 marines at Manila."

The Singapore correspondent of the Times says: "Letters received here from Manila, dated May 26, say that the prolonged conference between the German consul and Captain-General Augusti were exciting attention in Manila, and has led to the belief that

THE ATTACK ON THE MARINES.

At 9 o'clock firing was again renewed by the Spaniards, who appeared on the camp on the edge of a small island about a mile to the northeast. It was promptly returned by thirteen rifles in a 3-inch field gun, and in a short time all signs of the enemy had disappeared. Col. Huntington then sent to the landing for a second 3-inch gun. Subsequently the 3-inch gun was placed in position at the summit. The skirmish line thrown around the camp kept up a popping all the morning, but with not much result, to show for it. Meanwhile the Maribhead left the harbor and threw a few shells into the woods.

To the great delight of the marines' camp, Lieuts. Neville and Shaw, with 30 men of Company D, returned in good shape, but much exhausted by sixteen hours of picket duty. One man, Sergt. Smith, of Company K, had been shot through the abdomen and instantly killed. For most of the day eight lieuts. Neville and Shaw had been surrounded by a much superior force, but men and officers behaved splendidly.

At least five Spaniards are known to have been killed, and as Lieut. Neville's men kept up a steady fire throughout the night, and the enemy was not at a great distance, it is believed that the Spanish casualties were heavy.

POSITION OF THE INSURGENTS.

London, June 14.—A dispatch to the Standard from a special correspondent, dated off Cayo Romano, along the north coast of Puerto Principe, reports a conversation with a representative of the insurgent government in Cuba. The latter declared that the insurgents would accept nothing short of absolute independence. He represented that Gen. Maximo Gomez had gone personally to assist the Americans against Santiago de Cuba, and that the remainder were massed around Havana, which was being stoutly defended. The rainy season, he said, did not regard as very dangerous for the American troops, provided they fortified themselves with quinine.

FOLDING COFFINS.

Washington, June 14.—By a fortunate coincidence the naval ambulance ship Solace lately arrived off Santiago, and was available at once to take the wounded men who participated in the fight at Crest Hill. The dead will be buried on Cuban soil. To provide for every contingency the surgeon-general of the navy placed on board the Solace 25 folding coffins. They are away from observation and free from all gruesome appearance. They are to be used only for such wounded as die on board ships.

MORE ABOUT SANTIAGO.

London, June 14.—The morning papers publish further long accounts of the bombardment of Santiago on June 6, confirming the reports from the United States that Morro Castle and the Estrella battery were both set on fire by the American shells, and that the Spanish fortifications were immensely damaged. These versions say that the Massachusetts and the advance were somewhat injured by shells.

AWE-INSPIRING SPECTACLE.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent says: The spectacle was one of awe-inspiring grandeur. Nobody who saw it could ever forget it. The lightning flashed and the thunder boomed, drowning the roar of the guns, while a tropical rain poured through a perfect deluge. The Spanish shooting was better than the American.

The sunken collier Merrimack does not block the entrance of the channel. Admiral Sampson intends to try to force the entrance when the troops arrive. He expects to lose a ship or two, but is convinced that he will succeed.

The Daily Chronicle's correspondent says it is surprising that the American losses were so small, as the bombardment might fairly be claimed by the Spanish as a victory, for after three hours' fighting by the pick of the American fleet, Spain's colors were still floating.

ANOTHER SPANISH CRISIS.

London, June 14.—The Paris correspondent of the Morning Post says: I learn from trustworthy sources that the days of the Sagasta Cabinet are numbered. It is believed the cabinet is aware that the torpedo boat destroyer Terror has been lost, and despite official denials, it is rumored that there is further bad news from Cuba. Senor Silveira, leader of the dissident Conservatives, is regarded as the coming man. The Carlists are enrolling adherents, and startling developments are expected.

The Cadiz fleet is almost as much of a mystery as was Admiral Cervera's dying squadron during the two weeks immediately preceding its inglorious bottling up at Santiago. Yesterday a report came that the squadron was unfit for sea, yet as late as Saturday it was stated that it is already at sea.

THE \$200,000,000 WAR LOAN.

Washington, June 14.—The war revenue bill having been signed by the president, Secretary Gage issued a circular inviting subscriptions from the people of the United States for \$200,000,000 of the bonds of the 3 per cent loan authorized by the act of congress. Subscriptions will be received at par for 34 days. They will be dated Aug. 1, 1898, redeemable in coin at the pleasure of the United States after ten years from the date of their issue and due and payable Aug. 1, 1913.

POOR PROSPECT AT PORTO RICO.

St. Thomas, D. W. I., June 14.—Refugees from San Juan state that the newspapers say that two months of the existing conditions will bring Porto Rico to the verge of starvation. The government of the island has established a few public kitchens for the relief of those suffering most.
