Practically it has been impossible for shipping to enter or leave any of the harbors of the United States during the last two months betwen the hours of sunset and sunrise. The decision of the cab inet to remove these mines now is one of the most signal manifestations of the supreme confidence of the govern ment in the future, and the belief that the ports are free from attack at the

hands of any hostile power.

HEAD MONEY. Something over \$200,000 will be paid by this government as "head money" to the officers and sailors who destroyed Cervera's fleet. This is according to law, which provides payment of \$100 a head for every man on the ships of an enemy when these ships are destroyed. A few of the officers will receive pretty good fortunes.
