TERRIFIC HAILSTORM.
Neepawa, Man., July 13.—A terrific hailstorm passed over this district Monday. The storm started at 3 o'clock and lasted for about half an hour. The hail was as large as hen's eggs, and smashed nearly all the windows on the north side of buildings. The storm covered an area of two by twelve miles, starting ten miles from the west of here, and running two miles southeast. Most of the crops in this section are ruined.

A NEW OCEAN RECORD.
New York, July 13.—Messrs. Oelrichs & Co., the New York agents of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, received a cablegram from Capt. Englehart, saying that the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse had made the run from Sandy Hook lightship to the Needles in 5 days, 19 hours and 35 minutes, with an average speed of 22.6 knots, over a distance of 3,146 knots. This time is 2 hours and 27 minutes less than her best previous record to Southampton. On her present voyage the steamer covered 81 more miles than she did on her record-breaking trip.

The Prospects Of Peace!

Direct Proposals May Be Made in a Few Hours.

Dons Ready to Come to Terms If They Are Not Too Exacting.

The Warships' Guns Depended on to Reduce Santiago.

Reports That Spanish Soldiers Are Leaving the City Exaggerated.

Indications That Havana Will Not Be Attacked for Months to Come—After Santiago Then Porto Rico—Late News From Manila—Reports of German Interference.

New York, July 13.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Washington says: The actual departure of Commodore Watson's raiding squadron for the coast of Spain, which the naval authorities expect will occur about the end of the present week, indicates sufficiently the complete abandonment of any intention to besiege Havana in the next three or four months, and confirms the impression that no extended military operations will be prosecuted in Cuba after the capitulation of Santiago.

The remarkable difficulties which have attended the investment of Santiago and the resulting tedious delays have served to convince the military and naval authorities that Havana cannot be attacked successfully with less than 100,000 MEN

and the entire naval force in the Atlantic. The city, ordinarily one of the best fortified ports in the world, has been made much more impregnable in the last two months through the ceaseless activity of Gen. Blanco, who has surrounded it with several chains of strong entrenchments and batteries he has mounted along the coast, without the strong vessels attached to the raiding squadron the effective assistance to the army against Havana and it is deemed possible that the operations alone could insure the surrender of the city with less than several months campaign, which will be out of the question before climatic conditions.

POR TO RICO NEXT.
Promptly upon the fall of Santiago, it is announced, the expedition to Porto Rico is to be undertaken, with Gen. Miles in command of three divisions, aggregating more than 20,000 men. The co-operation of Admiral Sampson's heavier ships in the assault on San Juan, and it is his intention to take the entire island of Spanish troops with every energy at his command. His force will include practically all the regular volunteer troops now at Santiago, the Cubans and immunes being left to hold the province.
