NEARLY A SHUT-OUT.

The Hama received one of the best dubbings of the season at the hands of the locals yesterday. Baker, who was in the box for the visitors, was "easy" for the home team. The Hama were never in the game, at any point, and made some awful throws, which were responsible for a number of the runs made by London. The blackbirds failed to score until the ninth inning, and it looked for all the world like a shut-out.

The home team played with snap and vim, which made the game interesting to the spectators. They have apparently dominated their batting clothes again. Keenan and Smink both have three hits to their credit—something new for London, who has not been doing much stick work lately. The only thing the enthusiasts could not comprehend was how the aggregation that played yesterday could have taken the locals into camp so easily in Wednesday's game. One thing is certain, the Hama would never have survived the shock if they had been shut out. Manager "Chub" Collins' face wore an agonized look as the game progressed, but it brightened when the only run came in and saved a whitewash. What a come-down from the previous day!

The game was remarkable in more ways than one. In the first place it was the third time that the score had been 9 to 1 within four games—and London had the big end twice. Then Pitcher Friske, who won the game for Hamilton the day before, made two wild throws to first, and allowed three runs to score.

The scoring started in the first inning. Meara hit for two bases to left field, and Mohler followed with a double to right, scoring Meara. Mohler was caught at third in trying to reach that bag on the hit. It was a close decision, and the crowd took umpire Englund to task for it. London added three more runs in the fourth. Laroque made a clean hit for two bases, Keenan followed with a single, and Meara scored. Keenan scored on Lohman's drive to left field. Three more runs were piled up in the fifth. Smink singled, Laroque hit the same and Keenan followed. This filled the bases, when the noted Mr. Carey stepped up to the plate and rapped a hot one out between center and right fields. Both Congat and Friske started after it, and called it a home run in the ninth. McKevitt made a long drive to center for three bases, and scored on Deane's hit for two bases to the same pasture.

THE FORESTERS

Officers of the I. O. F. Supreme Court To Be Well Paid.

Presentation of \$5,000 to the Supreme Chief Ranger—A Minnesota Appeal Dismissed.

Toronto, Sept. 2.—The supreme court, I. O. F., resumed its deliberations yesterday, with Dr. Oronhyatkeha in the chair.

J. J. Clancy, M.P., submitted the report of the finance committee, which recommended that the salaries of the supreme court officers be fixed as follows: Supreme chief ranger, \$10,000 per annum; supreme secretary, \$5,000 per annum; supreme treasurer, \$2,000 per annum; supreme physicians, \$5,000 per annum.

The sum of \$100 was recommended to be given to the Supreme Journal secretary members of the mileage and per diem committee the sum of \$25 each; members of the press committee, \$30; the messenger, \$10.

An amendment placing the salary of the supreme treasurer at \$2,500, was carried, and the press committee was allowed \$30 each. The members of the committee on constitutions were allowed \$100 each for their labors.

The report as amended was adopted. The committee on finance then presented a supplementary report as follows: "We recommend the uniting industry and energy of our worthy supreme chief ranger, in the planning and erection of this magnificent temple, we recommend that he be paid the sum of \$5,000 as a mark of appreciation of his valuable and untiring work."

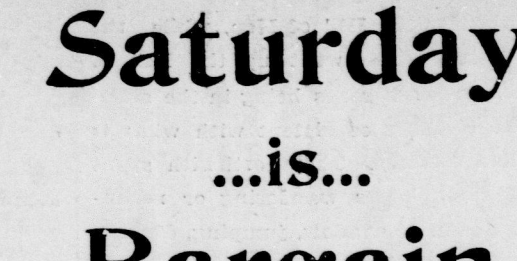
Mr. Clancy supported the proposal in a strong speech. Rev. Mr. Cregan, of Belfast, Ireland, endorsed Mr. Clancy's remarks. A. W. Frazer, of Ottawa, yielded to no man in his admiration for the high chief ranger, but he opposed the motion. G. D. Clark supported the report, as did W. H. Wardrope, and after the discussion closed the vote showed a large majority in favor of the motion.

The chairman of the committee on appeals submitted their report. Its recommendation, against the appeal from Minnesota for a division of the jurisdiction into high courts, without a petition from the existing high court in session, was discussed at length by Local High Chief Ranger O'Neill, J. H. Backus, Supreme Secretary J. A. McGilivray, Rev. W. G. McCaughan and Dr. Buckley. The report of the committee dismissing the appeal was adopted.

At the session of the high court of Central Ontario, I. O. F. W. B. Saunders was elected high chief ranger, and George L. Wilson was elected high vice-chief ranger.
