GOLF. ANNUAL TOURNAMENT.



# THE FORESTERS

Officers of the I. O. F. Supreme Court To Be Well Paid.

peal Dismissed.

Toronto, Sept. 2 .- The supreme court, I. O. F., resumed its deliberations yesterday, with Dr. Oronhyatekha in the chair.

J. Clancy, M.P., submitted the report of the finance committee, which recommended that the salaries of the supreme court officers be fixed as follows: Supreme chief ranger, \$10,000 per annum; supreme secretary, \$6,000 per annum; supreme treasurer, \$2,000 per annum; supreme physicians, \$6,000 per annum.

The sum of \$100 was recommended to be given to the Supreme Journal secretary; members of the mileage and per diem committee the sum of \$25 each; members of the press committee, \$30: the messenger, \$10. An amendment placing the salary of

the supreme treasurer at \$2,500, was carried, and the press committee were allowed \$50 each. The members of the committee on constitutions were allowed \$100 each for their labors.

The report as amended was adopted. The committee on finance then pre-

sented a supplementary report as fol-lows: "Recognizing the untiring industry and energy of our worthy supreme chief ranger, in the planning and erection of this magnificent temple, we recommend that he be paid the sum of \$5,000 as a mark of appreciation of his valuable and un-tiring work."

Mr. Clancy supported the proposal in a strong speech. Rev. Mr. Cregan, of Belfast, Ireland, indorsed Mr. Clancy's remarks. A. W. Fraser, of Ottawa, yielded to no man in his admiration for the high chief ranger, but he opposed the motion. G. D. Clark supported the report, as did W. H. Wardrope, and after the discussion closed the vote showed a large majority in favor of the motion. The chairman of the committee on appeals submitted their report. Its

recommendation against the appeal from Minnesota for a division of the from Minnesota for a division of the jurisdiction into high courts, without a petition from the existing high court in session, was discussed at length by Local High Chief Ranger O'Neill, J. H. Backus, Supreme Secretary J. A. McGillivray, Rev. W. G. McCaughan and Dr. Buckley. The research the compittee dismissing the port of the committee dismissing the appeal was adopted. At the session of the high court of Central Ontario, I. O. F., W. B. Saun-ders was elected high chief ranger, and George L. Wilson was elected high
