several times. Petrolea Oil Development.

During the year just past the total output of crude oil from F'etrolea amounted to 1.078.826 barrels. The Topic says: "The production of the greater part of the wells in the Northwest Territory has suffered during the past three years owing to the difficulty in procur-ing crude benzine from the refiners, and everything has been resorted to to keep up the production without it, but nothing has been found equal to it for cleansing the veins of accumulated paraffine. We have been informed that one enterprising operator has been ex-perimenting with heated salt water. He had one well which appeared to be of little use or profit, so he gave "It a good dose or two of hot salt water some time ago, and has made the well good for two barrels or more a day. It has kept this pumping up every day since first "flooding" it in that way. He purposes, if the well continues to do so good, to put an old portable boiler alongside of it, and, whenever he wants to "flood" it. fill the boiler with salt water and heat it with the gas from the well."
