ANGLO-CANADIAN TRADE. London, June 11 .- The board of trade returns for the five months ending in May show the following increase in British imports from Canada: Cattle, £58,000; wheat, £30,000; wheat flour, £34,000; oats, £93,000; bacon, £154,000; ham, £26,000; cheese, £68,000; eggs, £7,000; fish, £227,000; hewn wood, £22,-The decreases were: Maize, FRICTION.

Yokohama, June 11.-More serious, from a Japanese point of view, than the rising of the Boxers in China, is the sudden tension between Japan and Corea, as the result of the protests of Japan against the tortures and execution of political prisoners by the Corean Government. The Corean emperor absolutely refuses to grant an audience to the Japanese minister, Hayashi Gonsonke.

London, June 11.-Despite expectations, and despite the war, the official emigration returns show an enor-mous increase in the United States and about 42 years of age and came originally from Chesley, Ont., as also did Canada. The Canadian total for May was 7,313, compared with 3,730 for May 1899. The figures for the five months in each year are 18,501, as compared with 11,822. The United States figures have increased from 17,802 to 23,542 for the month, and from 56,253 to 69,380 for the five months.

FEAST TO SIR HENRY IRVING. London, June 11 .- At the Savoy Hotel Saturday night, a complimentary dinner was given to welcome home of Craven, F. Burnard, Reginald Ward, Charles Frohman, Maurice Grau, Bret
