TRAGEDY NEAR GANANOQUE.

John Fitzsimons Shot—Result of a Dispute About the Ownership of a House.

John Fitzsimons Shot-Result of a Dispute About the Ownership of a House.

Gananoque, Ont., March 24.—A fatal case of shooting occurred to-day, about eight miles east of here, by which John Fitzsimons lost ais life. The ownership of a house and a small piece of land in the locality mentioned was in dispute. Fitzsimons claimed it by right of purchase from all the heirs but one, and Mr. Joles claimed it as the heir whose interest had not been purchased. Lately the Joles family meved into the house. A week ago John Fitzsimons and three of his sons ejected the Joles family, throwing their effects out on the road.

Several police court cases were the result, and to-day the magistrate dismissed all but two of the charges, and fined John Fitzsimons and one of the sons \$5 cach. This morning Mr. Joles took his effects back to the house with the intention of moving in. He was assisted by Charles Shipman. Mrs. Joles' father, John Fitzsimons, who was in the house, forbade them entering. It is said Fitzsimons also shot at them with a revolver, and then heat Shipman over the head with it. Shipman retreated, and Fitzsimons shut the inside door.

A son of Shipman was returning with a loaded gun from duck shooting. Shipman says he took the gun from him and going to the door called out he could shoot, too. He pointed the gun at the inside door, when it accidentally went off. Waiting a few minutes, Shipman opened the door and found Fitzsimons lying dead on the floot, the shot having penetrated his chest. Shipman then surrendered to the police magistrate. He is badly cut about the head.

Fitzsimons was 57 years of age. One of his sons is a merchant and postmaster at Rockport.
