The old objection was raised that the deposits were smaller than the loans, but, as has been pointed out before, this is not as serious a feature as many people believe it to be, for the reason that many banks have now a larger surplus and capital than at any retail.

Fruits-There was a large supply of this capital and surplus is an entirely legitimate operation. As to the natural of the market, although sentiment is more cheerful, no one believes for a minute that anything like a bull market can take place. Money is not sufficiently plentiful, and there is a decided lack of confidence. We do not look for much relaxation in the money market until after the end of the year.


