This is particularly true of the torpedo boat flotilla, which is assembling at Norfolk in preparation for a series of important maneuvers, planned by the general board of the navy, which is just now engaged in putting into practical operation its scheme for perfecting defense of the coasts. Most of the torpedo boats in the flotilla left Port Royal, S. C., with just enough coal to take them to Norfolk, where they expected to find enough fuel to fill their bunkers. Owing to non-deliveries on account of the strike, there was not enough coal left at Norfolk to accommodate these little vessels, lanited as their bunker capacity is, and the flotilla is practically unable to move. There is enough coal at some other stations to supply the wants of the torpedo craft, but the navy department has not determined whether to use this now or keep it for some unexpected emergency. Not only is there a scarcity of an-

thracite coal, but the strike has affected apparently the bituminous fields, as soft coal contractors have notified the navy department that they are unable to make deliveries. From Norfolk southward the navy has scarcely enough fuel for present requirements. Fortunately, all the big armorelads on the North Atlantic stations are laid up for temporary repairs, and the amount of coal required to run ships is much smaller than was the case a few weeks ago and will be again a month hence. Every effort will be made by the department to overcome the difficulty in time to permit the big squadron on the home station to take part in the Lond Island Sound war game. It may be necessary, however, to concentrate present supplies that the ships whose duties are regarded as most important may be kept busy without interruption. It is the un-derstanding, however, that even if enough coal is available, the navy department will refuse to buy if extravagant prices are asked. A number of contracts made by the equipment oureau months ago, at reasonable rates, are still running, but the contractors, it is feared; will be unable to comply with the terms of their agreements.

A resolution was adopted and telephoned to Governor Yates, calling on him to take immediate steps to protect the lives and property of the colored people at El-dorado and Harrisburg, Ill.
