CIVIL WAR ON IN RUSSIA, REBELS DEFEAT THE TROOPS, FIRE AND SWORD AT MITAU

Livonia Desolated by Torch===Letts Plunder Germans With Great Barbarities=-Cossacks Rushed From East

Mitau, Courland, Russia (undated), by mail to St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.-Frightful stories are pouring in from the interior, where desperate fighting has occurred between the troops and insurgents. Revolting tales are told of the barbarities practiced on the German landlords, who are more detested by the Letts than the Russians. In a fight near Tukun fourteen dragoons were killed and sixteen were wounded. It is estimated that the insurgents

A squadron of cavalry was ambushed and badly cut up near Grossanz and limped into Mitau with its wounded.

Mitau, Province of Courland, Dec. 17.—(Delayed in transmission). — The troops, in order to avoid annihilation at the hands of the insurgents have been forced to abandon the country districts and to concentrate at Riga, Mitau and Libau, where they actually are standing on the defensive, unable to make head against the insurgents. Several detachments have been defeated.

The garrison at Takum, consisting of a squadron of dragoons, and a company of infantry, not being able to depart in time, was set upon at night and lost its commander, Lieut.- Col. Mueller and 30 men. The insurgents, evading the sentinels, penetrate d the town and laid wire entanglements in front of the house in which the w earied soldiers were quartered. Then they set fire to the houses, and the troops rushing out were shot down from roofs or cut up in the narrow streets: The soldiers retired in confusion. leaving their dead. The latter were h orribly maltreated by the insurgents, who gouged out their eyes and cut off their ears and hands. Insurgents, who form great bands, have a regul ar military organization and are well armed with rifles and bayonets.

Rushing Troops From Manchuria.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.-In spite of the statement that two army corps are being sent to the Baltic Provinces, it is learned that no such number of troops are available. The Government has sent two regiments from St. sidered too dangerous to deplete the garrison of the capital any further during the present crisis, and the Government can only await the arrival of the Cossacks and other troops, which are being hurried forward by Gen. Linerebellion, which is pushing forward to the Polish frontier, may arouse the Poles to an armed uprising.

The Rupublic of Krakoff.

Reliable details regarding the establishment of the so-called Republic of Krakoff have at last arrived. The workmen's socialistic organizations, joined by 300 troops, took possession of the city, and with the aid of a militia armed with pikes, revolvers, and axes, established a government or "federated council," as the executive committee was called. This council issued decrees which the authorities were perfectly powerless to resist. The council turned off the electricity from the houses on the ground that it only benefited the rich, while allowing it to burn in the streets, where it benefited the people and declared war on the thieves who had previously been terrorizing the city. When a robber was captured, he was placed under a tripnammer with the threat that it would be dropped unless he revealed MR. SCOTT IS OPTIMISTIC whereabouts of his booty.
