Toronto, Aug. 24.—When the C. P. R. first undertook to feed their strike-breakers in the yards at West Toronto they had both hands full, and sufficient to fill a third hand.

One chef, one waiter, and one stove failed to touch the appetites of the hungry strike-breakers. And there was trouble.

Men grumbled, left their jobs and went elsewhere. Officials were busy keeping engines hauling cars over 10,000 miles of track, and things got bad. Then came a change.

How Staff Was Increased.

They shipped down a special man from Montreal to make things go. They gave John Handley, the chef, two assistant cooks, four waiters and two dishwashers. And they gave him two stoves.

Besides this, after a visit by the West Toronto health inspector, the three box cars, which had been used as kitchens and dining-rooms, were given up, and one end of the paintshop was used as a kitchen and dining-room.

This removed one of the strike-breakers' grievances. Now everyone could sit down together. Before had to wait in the middle of the day for dinner.

Cooking Operations.

Tremendous cooking operations are carried on within the confines of the chef. When porridge is given to the men in the morning twelve gallons must be made. And to keep this amount from burning is no joke.

When ham and boiled eggs are served, 300 eggs are cooked, and some ninety pounds of ham. This is aided by twenty loaves of bread. It is cut up into thick slices.

Thirty gallons of coffee, or the same amount of tea, is served with this meal. The two long tables are covered with white oilcloth, and each man has a tin plate, tin cup, and a knife, fork and spoon. The men sit on long benches without backs.

Feats at Dinner.

At dinner, which is in the middle of the day, the strike-breakers have consumed a whole steer. On another occasion they ate two whole sheep. Three bags of potatoes are eaten at each meal, either fried or boiled.

At this meal, by way of dessert one day, six gallons of bread pudding, three gallons of prunes and three gallons of boiled raisins were served. They also were given a small barrel of apples.

In the days of the one chef, one waiter and one stove, the men used to run from the workshop to the cars, to get their place; but now they take their time.

And Then Supper.

At supper the chef has not so many men to look after. A great number of them go home. But he has the 150 men who live in the yards.

These men can, besides eating beef, veal, potatoes and various other things, put away at supper 40 pies. They also do away with a five gallon pail of pickles and a pail of jam.

Midnight dinner is for the detectives and night gangs, and the chef usually feeds sixty at this meal.

Sixty pounds of butter are used every day, as are eight loaves and thirty-five gallons of milk. It's a big job feeding all the men.

Lodge 'Em and Wash 'Em.

And besides feeding them, the C. P. R. has to lodge 150 and also wash them.

The paintshop at one end is partitioned off, and 150 spring cots are put up. Each cot has the spring raised at one end instead of having a mattress and the mattress covers this. Each man is given a pair of blankets. The men pay \$4.50 a week for board and lodging.

There is a shower bath and tubs, with hot and cold water, walled off from the sleeping rooms by tarred paper.

A typewritten notice, signed by Mr. Preston, draws, in nicely-worded sentences, the attention of the men to the fact that hot and cold water may be had, and to the sanitary necessity for cleanliness.

CANADA'S PRODUCE IN GREAT BRITAIN

A Better Quality Is Now Being
Received in Butter and
Cheese.

London, Aug. 24.—Great Britain in 1907 exported to Canada 61,783 horses, the biggest export ever known, though the total value \$1,240,000, was exceeded in 1906. Canada comes first of all countries as a purchaser of stallions, and second only to Belgium as a purchaser of mares.

Butter Imports Small.

The Weddel Company's Colonial Dairy Produce Review states that the Canadian butter export was the smallest known since 1895. Three years ago it reached its highest level, 15,145 tons. Last year it fell to 1,862 tons. The quality again showed an improvement over the previous year, as was refrigeration on board steamers to the United Kingdom and on landing wharves here is now perfectly up-to-date, Canadian butter ought to further improve in quality, and bring higher prices in our markets.

Some inferior quality, which yet comes, is due to damage caused by want of proper refrigerating arrangements before it is shipped, and the remainder to defects in its manufacture, which are avoidable if proper care be taken.

Decrease in Cheese.

In cheese there has been a steady decrease. Canada and United States. This decrease has given an opportunity to New Zealand to make up some of the deficiency. Imports from New Zealand have advanced in ten years from 5,870 tons to 13,152 tons. Improvement in quality continues to be shown in the Canadian. Improved methods of curing and better transit arrangements have added largely to the better quality which now prevails in this article.

Australian Product Good.

Australia last year sent a small shipment of cheese to London, and the quality was very satisfactory. One shipment from New South Wales was of superior quality to the best Canadian, owing to it being made on the English cheddar principle and it approached very closely to English conditions of manufacture in having the milking herd close to the factory door so that the milk was always in sweet condition when it came under the cheesemaker's control.

The advance made in Canadian was 9 shillings a cwt. or 16.6 per cent. The average price for the past twelve months is 1-3 less than in 1907.

TWENTY-DOLLAR WHEAT

Harvested 70,000 to 75,000 Bushels of
Wonderful New Variety.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 23.—In the Juliaetta country, in Northern Idaho, Abraham Adams, formerly a lumberman in Wisconsin, will clean up more than \$1,000,000 from 700 acres of land this season, in addition to producing grain which gives every promise of revolutionizing the wheat production of the world. Conservative estimates place the crop at from 70,000 to 75,000 bushels of grain, which Adams and his son-in-law, O. K. Hobe, a wholesale lumber dealer, of Minneapolis, have contracted to sell to farmers at \$20 a bushel, not more than one bushel going to each buyer.

Adams acquired a tract of land in the Gem State six years ago and sowed his land to wheat, harvesting from 23 to 30 bushels of blue stem club and other varieties from every acre under cultivation.

One day early in 1904 he received a single stalk of wheat, picked by a friend in one of the fertile valleys in Alaska, and sowed the kernels in his garden. A crop of seven pounds resulted the following summer. This Adams planted in the spring of 1905, harvesting 1,545 pounds of grain in July, or over 200 bushels per acre. Emboldened by his success he sowed another crop in the fall of 1906, and this summer cut enough grain to sow 700 acres of land, from which is now being cut what is believed to be the world's record yield.

A POPULAR CURATE

St. John's Congregation Presents Praise
and Address to Rev. Mr. Clarke.

A large and representative gathering of the congregation of St. John's Anglican Church of London Township took place on Thursday evening last at the beautiful residence of Mrs. Thurston, Arva.

The nature of the affair was purely social, with an impromptu programme. The grounds and verandah were very prettily decorated with Japanese lanterns. During the intermission, Rev. A. L. G. Clarke, the popular and efficient curate and assistant rector of St. John's Church, who has had charge of the parish in the absence of Ven. Archdeacon Richardson, who has been attending the Pan-Anglican Conference in London, England, was called upon and made the recipient of a well-filled purse and address, as a small token of appreciation for the earnest zeal and endeavor in his duties, by the members of St. John's Guild and congregation. The address was read by Mr. Athol Marshall, and Mr. R. A. Powell made the presentation.

PUNISHED THE CAPTAIN.

Montreal, Aug. 24.—Commander Spence, chief commissioner, was severe today in his judgment in the Imperial Quebec collision of July 5 on Capt. Jean, of the Imperial, not only declaring that the captain caused a menace to navigation as well as to his passengers in allowing an apprentice pilot to run his vessel, and also suspending his certificate for one year. Both steamers were found to have been at fault but the Quebec was properly manned, while the Imperial had only an apprentice pilot at the wheel.

HOW TO FIGHT THE HESSIAN FLY

Ontario Agricultural College: Issues
Warning and Advice
to Farmers.

Guelph, Aug. 25.—The department of entomology of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, has recently been informed of a somewhat serious outbreak of the Hessian fly in several parts of the northwest of Ontario, particularly in the counties of Norfolk, Brant and Bruce. In Norfolk a reliable correspondent reports a loss of thirty per cent in some wheat fields.

In order to fight this pest intelligently a short account of its life history is necessary.

The Hessian fly is a tiny, two-winged insect about one-tenth of an inch long and looking like a very small mosquito. There are two broods of these flies in Ontario in a year. The adult flies lay their eggs during May and June in the groove on the upper surface of the leaves of fall or spring wheat, or less frequently of barley and rye. After a few days tiny maggots hatch out and work their way down between the stem and leaf to near the joints. Here they remain until full grown, sucking the juice out of the plant and causing it to become weak at the affected part, usually the first or second joint, so that it falls over before it is ripe. When the maggots are full grown they change their color from nearly white to dark-brown and become hard. This stage is known as the flaxseed stage from its resemblance to flaxseed. When the grain is cut, some of the flaxseeds will be in the straw of the sheaves and carried to the barn, but most of them will be left in the stubble. About the end of August or early in September from these flaxseeds there emerge the full-grown winged flies. These now lay their eggs on the young and tender wheat plants, whether these be merely volunteer wheat that has sprung up in the old stubble or the freshly sown wheat for next year's crop. When these eggs hatch out, the young maggots work their way down to the crown of the plants and do much damage before the winter, causing the wheat to lose its healthy appearance and look white and sickly. At the close of autumn most of the maggots have become full-grown and enter the flaxseed stage in which they remain through the winter until May or June when as said above, the two-winged flies come forth.

How to Combat It.

The following suggestions for lessening the attack of the fly are in accordance with the recommendation of Dr. James Fletcher, Ottawa, and Mr. F. M. Webster, Washington, and will be found of much service if tried.

(1) Choose only good plump seed for sowing, not shrivelled or sprouted seed.

(2) Do not sow wheat in the same fields as were infested this year, but rotate your crops.

(3) Prepare the soil with extra care in order to produce as rapid growing and vigorous plants as possible. This helps to enable them to recover from attacks.

(4) Do not sow your wheat this fall before Sept. 15. If the ground has been well prepared this will leave plenty of time for a good growth before winter and the damp weather of August practically insures that the fly will nearly all have emerged and laid their eggs before Sept. 15.

(5) Plough down the volunteer wheat, barley or rye growing in the stubble fields not later than the end of September, because if the maggots are left long enough to enter the flaxseed stage many of them may escape next year in spite of the ploughing.

(6) Often much benefit has been gained by burning all the rubbish that falls beneath the threshing machine. This will naturally contain many of the flaxseeds.

JEROME CLEARED

Investigation Finds Famous District
Attorney Innocent of All Charges.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 24.—Richard L. Hand, of Elizabethtown, who was appointed by Governor Hughes to take testimony and report his findings upon the charges filed against District Attorney Jerome, of New York County, by a minority stockholders' committee of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, in a report submitted to the governor today finds that not one of the series of charges proved, but that all are disproved upon the evidence. He recommends the dismissal of the charges. A request was made for Mr. Jerome's removal.

Governor Hughes has not acted upon Commissioner Hand's report.

"My conviction upon the whole case," says the report, "is that the respondent has been shown to have discharged the onerous duties of his office with zeal and ability, having the public good as his motto, and that no incapacity, indifference or neglect of duty has been shown in any case."

CAUGHT IN THE ACT.

New York, Aug. 24.—After following three men from New York City through Providence, R. I., Boston and Philadelphia, and then back to this city, seven detectives from police headquarters yesterday arrested the men as they were about to blow open a safe in Newark, N. J. Weeks were spent in trailing the men, who are suspected of a series of daring safe robberies in New York city. Inspector McCallerty finally assigned his keenest detectives to the job, with instructions to keep on the trail till the band were caught in the act of blowing open a safe. The detectives learned that the men suspected had headquarters in Brooklyn, and Hoboken. In the house in Brooklyn was found an extensive counterfeiting outfit.

ROUND WORLD FOR SEALS

Halifax Schooner To Start On a Long Trip.

Halifax, Aug. 24.—The sealing schooner Agnes Donahoe will leave today for a year's sealing trip around the world. She clears for points and places in the north and south Atlantic, the north and south Pacific, and the Indian Ocean, her final port of discharge being Halifax. It is expected she will sail 15,000 or 20,000 miles before she returns to Halifax, and new sealing waters will be explored. Captain Balcome expects to go via Cape of Good Hope to the Indian Ocean and southern Pacific, returning via Cape Horn. The Agnes G. Donahoe is the schooner which was seized by the Uruguay Government for alleged poaching three years ago when several of the crew were imprisoned. They were only released after strong representations had been made by the Imperial Government, although the charge against them was groundless.
