ELEVEN KILLED, 26 WOUNDED

Explosion at Military Station Causes Death of Eleven Native Soldiers and Non-Commissioned Officers and a Score of Injured Will Die.

Calcutta, Dec. 7 .- An explosion in the magazine at the military station here today resulted in the killing of eleven men and the wounding of twenty-six others. Most of the injured will die. The casualties were all among native soldiers and non-commissioned officers. At the time of the explosion the men were engaged in converting ball cartridges into blank cartridges. It was at first reported that the accident was the work of agitators, but this rumor was quickly disproved.

Terrible Toll of the Storm King

Halifax, Dec. 7.-More than half a hundred seamen have lost their lives off the upper North Atlantic Coast during the past few days as the result of a storm of unprecedented severity, and it is possible that the turbulent sea has claimed even a greater toll of lives. The reckoning, itemized as accurately as the meagre reports will allow, is as follows: Dec. 3.—Seventeen members of the crews of three fishing

schooners drowned off the Newfoundland Coast. Dec.4.—Twenty-eight members of the crew of the steamer Soo City, which is believed to have sunk in the Gulf of St.

Dec. 5 .- Seven members of the crew of barge 101, which

went down off the coast of Nova Scotia. In addition to this death toll, which includes no passengers, there developed a mystery tonight in the discovery of life, belts, bearing the name "S. S. Stanley," which were washed ashore with the wreckage from the Son City. No steamer of that name navigating in this vicinity has been reported, and in lieu of any other explanation it is said that those life belts might have been a second-hand purchase for use aboard the
