LONDON AND DISTRICT
Late W. H. Drake.
The funeral of Mr. W. H. Drake, of Windsor, father of Dr. F. P. Drake, of this city, was held in Windsor on Friday last, and was very largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. W. H. Mrs. Margaret Ward Dead.
Mrs. Margaret Ward, for the past 88 years a continuous resident of London Township, died this morning at her home, lot 23, concession 1, London Township. She was in her 90th year, and came to Canada with her parents from Liverpool, England. They settled in London Township, and resided there for many years. Mrs. Ward leaves two sons, Michael, of this city; Patrick, of London Township, and one daughter, Miss Margaret, at home. The funeral will be held on Monday morning to St. Peter's Cathedral, and interment will be made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

Offered a Position.
The following is clipped from a recent issue of The Nassau Guardian (Bahamas, W. I.): Mr. Ashplant, recently spent several weeks' vacation in London, and has many friends in this city. We understand that his excellency the governor received a cable this week from the secretary of state for the colonies offering to Mr. W. Norman Ashplant, assistant civil engineer, a district engineering on the staff of the Uganda Public Works Department, East Africa. Mr. Ashplant has had considerable experience, having spent about eleven years in South Africa, where he was engaged mainly upon municipal engineering works in Cape Town, Pretoria and Johannesburg, and he is also acquainted with conditions in Egypt and East Africa. Since his arrival in this colony his work has been of such a nature as to extort the unqualified praise of members of the House of Assembly during a debate last session. As we learn that Mr. Ashplant has declined the appointment we shall not, for the present at any rate, be deprived of his services.

BONHAG SETS RECORDS
Runner Clips Three Marks in Five-Mile Race of A. A. U. Championships.

New York, Sept. 10.—At Travers Island today the annual senior championship contests of the Metropolitan Association of the A. A. U. were marked by the breaking of three American records in the five-mile run by George V. Bonhag, of the Irish-American A. C., and the failure of Melvin V. Sheppard to get away at the start of the first trial heat of the 440-yard race. Bonhag practically led all the way in the five-mile run, which he won easily by a fifth of a mile in 23:09 1-5, a new American record. The former record was made by E. C. Carter, of the New York A. C., in 25:23 3-5 on Sept. 17, 1887. Bonhag today made two other American records in the same race, the first being 20:11 for four miles, beating 20:15 4-5 made by the late William Day twenty-one years ago, and the four and one-half-mile record of E. C. Carter, made twenty-three years ago. Carter's time was 22:53 4-5, but Bonhag today just romped past the mark in 22:43 1-5.

BANK EXAMINERS BLAMED.
Washington, Sept. 10.—Comptroller of the Currency Murray, in a statement issued today, asserted that every recent national bank failure could have been averted if bank examiners had reported actual conditions. He announces that he will make a personal investigation of every district.

ARCHDIACONAL CONFERENCE
Prominent Speakers to Address Next Gathering at Exeter.

The Venerable Archdeacon Richardson, of London, has arranged to hold his next conference at Exeter. His archdeaconry includes three counties, Middlesex, Lambton and Huron. In the two former counties (Middlesex and Lambton), very successful and representative conferences have already been held at Glencoe and Sarnia, and now the next conference is fixed for Exeter on Oct. 11 and 12. The programme includes live, practical subjects, such as Bible study, moral reform, Huron College jubilee, church literature and inter-denominational fellowship. The archdeacon will deliver his address on the first day and the Bishop of Huron will preach on the first evening.

At the concluding session on Wednesday evening, Oct. 12, Miss T. A. Connell (head deaconess of Deaconess House, Toronto), and Canon Hague will be the speakers, the former discussing deaconess work, and the latter describing the recent Halifax bicentenary celebration. The Rev. Dr. W. Collins, rector of Exeter, has already awakened a lively interest in this gathering among his parishioners, and Exeter people may be counted on to offer sincere hospitality to all visitors, and to roll up a good attendance at all sessions of the conference.

SCARCITY OF MINISTERS
Presbyterian General Assembly Adopts a New Plan.

Toronto, Sept. 9.—The Presbyterian General Assembly appointed a committee to consider means to overcome the shortage of clergymen. Rev. C. W. Gordon being chairman.

At the meeting of this committee yesterday it was decided that a college term of three months each year for five years be taken up by these in the mission field to qualify them for the ministry, providing they take the same course for four years following, with other studies that may be deemed sufficient.

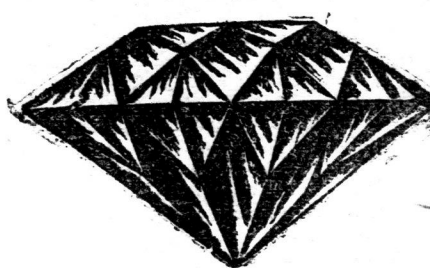

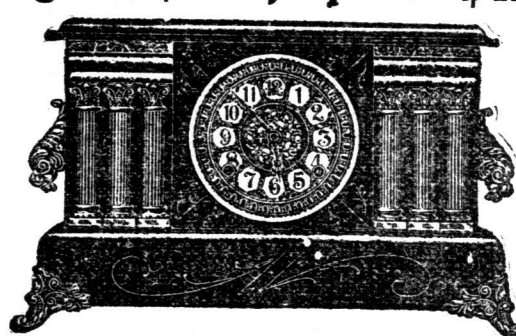

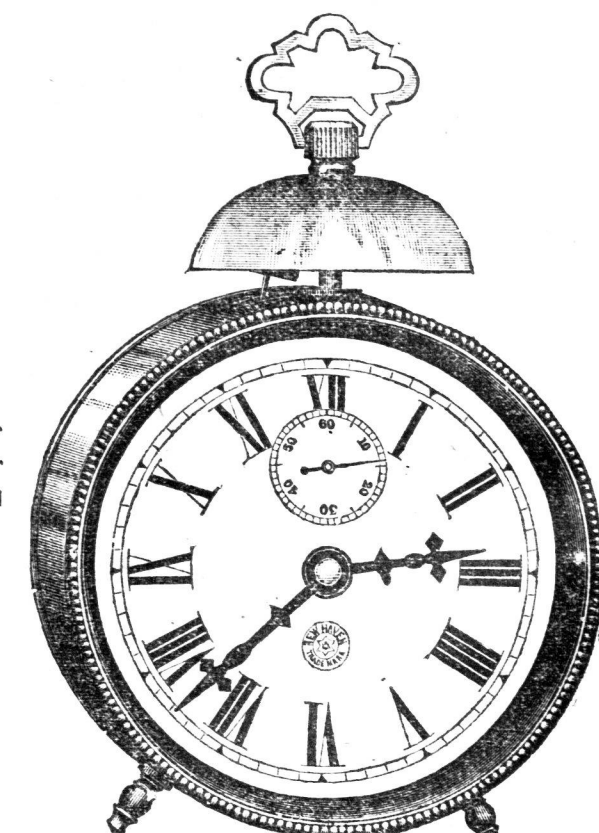
