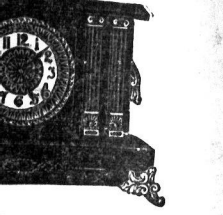

FARMERS' DAY AT WESTERN FAIR BROUGHT TREMENDOUS CROWD

Grounds Swarmed With Enthusiastic Thousands—Directors Are Optimistic Regarding the Breaking of All Records.

Farmers' Day, as usual, is the greatest day of the Fair. All morning thousands of visitors poured into the city from all parts of Western Ontario. Every train was crowded, some of them having ten and twelve coaches. The streets were jammed with people, and the stores were filled with visitors anxious to do shopping before seeing the exhibition. The directors are looking for all attendance records to be broken, and judging from the crowd on the grounds this afternoon, it will be an easy matter to accomplish. Before noon, hundreds wanted to crowd into the grandstands, and it was with considerable difficulty that the enormous crowds were handled by the staff.

Directors Are Happy.

The Fair is running with rare smoothness. As a result, the directors are happy men, and are confident that the Western will be a success financially. There is no question about the fact that it is the best from the standpoint of exhibits in recent years. Mr. W. M. Spencer, chairman of the gates and tickets committee, would not estimate the attendance today, but declared that it would probably be larger than any time during the past. In addition to it being Farmers' Day, there is a large outpouring of citizens.

Live Stock Parade.

The judging has been completed. The first parade of the prize-winning stock was held this afternoon at 1 o'clock. It was a revelation to many city folks to see such a magnificent array of fine stock. American visitors marvelled at the very high quality of the cattle and horses.

There have been few protests on the judgment of the men who made the awards. At the meeting of the board of directors at noon today, one protest was entered. It was against the awarding of the prizes in the Percheron stallion classes, and the matter was referred to the horse committee. New judges will be named, and the class rejudged in all probability.

There was no other business to be transacted, and the board adjourned. W. H. Entertain Council.

\$10,000 ACTION AGAINST C. P. R.

Widow of the Late Gilbert Jones Is Suing for Loss of Husband.

COMPANY WILL FIGHT

But If It Is Shown That C. P. R. Are To Blame, \$2,000 Is To Be Brought Into Court For Settlement.

The first jury case for the high court, which opens here on Oct. 2, was set down this morning at the court house, when Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons, acting for Mary Jones, entered the statement of claim in the action brought by the widow of Gilbert Jones against the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Mrs. Jones asks for \$10,000 damages, and while the company denies all responsibility, it is shown that they are in the wrong. \$2,000 is to be brought into court for an immediate settlement, this being the amount which it is calculated a man in Jones' position could earn in three years.

The Action.

According to the statement of claim, Gilbert Jones, a Londoner, employed in the local C. P. R. yards, was ordered out on a train showing a snowplow east on Feb. 14 last. Henry Weymark was in charge of the plow, and it is alleged that he alone could see the signals ahead and that therefore the train was under his control. The snowplow passed the signals, and running into an open switch collided with a standing train. The rules of the Dominion railway commission are quoted to show that any person employed in such a responsible position is required to pass an examination and test for sight and hearing. In this connection, it is alleged that Weymark had never passed such an examination.

But common law and the workmen's compensation act are invoked by the plaintiff. The victim of the accident left his widow, Mary Jones, and two children, Coral, aged 20, and Rose, aged 11.

The Company's Plea.

The company stated that if there was negligence it was on the part of Jones' fellow-employees, and that in taking his position he accepted this responsibility. The "code" will be brought into play when the action is called if the plaintiff cares to make a settlement on that basis. This is the action brought by Mr. John M. Parsons to prevent the city of London selling the city hall building and land with a part of the market square, to the Royal Bank. The case will come up for trial in London in a few weeks.

CHATHAM LADY DIED WHILE VISITING HERE

Sudden Demise of Mrs. Frank Dalgleish, a Western Fair Visitor.

Mrs. Frank Dalgleish, aged 31, of Chatham, died very unexpectedly in Victoria Hospital shortly after 1 o'clock this morning from dilation of the heart, caused by acute indigestion. Mrs. Dalgleish came to the fair on Monday with her husband and spent the afternoon and evening there.

Yesterday morning she was out at the grounds again, and in the afternoon went down to the G. T. R. depot to see Mr. Dalgleish off on the 2:05 train. She was then apparently in excellent health, and until shortly before 8 o'clock in the evening when she was on her way to the house of her cousin, Mrs. Brotherton, of 512 Grey street, did she become ill. When near the house Mrs. Dalgleish complained of feeling a choking sensation, and when she went in the house was given some soda and water as Mrs. Brotherton thought she had some stomach trouble. She continued to suffer a great deal, and shortly after midnight Mr. Cline was called. He had her removed at once to Victoria Hospital in the city ambulance. Mrs. Dalgleish sank steadily, and died soon after 1 o'clock.

Coroner MacLaren was notified, and after making a thorough investigation decided that no inquest was necessary. Mr. Dalgleish was notified by telegram and arrived in the city this afternoon. Mrs. Dalgleish was a native of Shakespear, Ontario, and was the daughter of two sisters, Misses Kate and Ethel Bower, now reside. He said that many of the hotels obtained their entire supply from Chicago during the winter, but that it did not come in such large quantities in the summer.

One of the hotelkeepers explained the saving effected in one item—tenderloin.

"Take tenderloins for instance," he said. "We have them laid down in London at 19 cents a pound. The firm of Libby, McNeill & Libby, pays the express and 3 cents a pound duty."

If reciprocity, which reduces the duty to 1 1/2 cents per pound, were in force today, the hotelkeepers would buy tenderloin for 17 1/2 cents a pound. FIERCE MAN-HUNT FOLLOWS KIDNAPPING OF SCHOOL TEACHER

Former Zurich, Ontario, Lady Brutally Attacked by Desperado Who Has Been Trained by Bloodhounds and Cornered.

Snowflake, Man, Sept. 12.—A fierce man-hunt and deadly skirmish resembling Indian warfare has been under way for the past 24 hours ten miles between here and the United States border. The sensational situation is the climax of the kidnapping of a pretty young school teacher, Eleanor Gladys Price, formerly of Zurich, Ont., by a desperado believed to be Henry Bill Wilson, alias Bill Miner, of Hannah, N. B. All during the night a force of three hundred pursued the fugitive through the bush, and many shots were exchanged. At sunrise he was surrounded in a dense wood.

Bloodhounds picked up the trail five miles from the schoolhouse where the kidnapper captured the girl on Monday afternoon. She returned home in a frightful condition last night. The populace is in an infuriated state, and the score of constables directing the pursuit will be unable to protect the man if he is caught. The American officials just over the line have sent a posse into Canada to pursue the fugitive through the south.

ALD. MITCHELL SMASHED AUTO BUT SAVED LIFE OF LITTLE CHILD

Six-Year-Old Helen Morgan Ran Directly in Front of Machine at the Corner of Dundas and Wellington Streets Last Evening.

The presence of mind of Ald. F. G. Mitchell alone saved 6-year-old Helen Morgan, of Port Stanley, from death Tuesday afternoon on Dundas and William streets, by being run down by an automobile. She was slightly injured, but will be around in a day or two.

The child was playing with several other children. Ald. Mitchell was coming from the Fair grounds about 5 o'clock, and was running at a fair rate of speed. Just as he reached the place where the children were the Morgan child ran out directly in front of the machine.

Ald. Mitchell had no time to stop the machine, and must strike the girl or wreck his auto, taking chances of injury to himself.

Deciding instantly he jerked the steering gear over, crashing into the curb.

The fender of the machine caught the little girl and dragged her some distance.

A Close Call.

Ald. Mitchell jumped out of the auto and picked the child up. She was taken at once into Dr. N. H. Beal's office, where her injuries were examined. It was found that other than a few bruises, she was not badly hurt, and was able to go to her home.

"The child was more frightened than hurt," said Dr. Beal. "She was bruised somewhat, but nothing at all serious. She had a narrow escape!"

The automobile was badly smashed. One wheel was completely wrecked, and other parts of it was smashed.

"It was either smash the machine or hit the child," said Ald. Mitchell. "I did not have much time in which to make up my mind, as she ran right in front of me."

MICHIGAN FARMERS' ASSN.
OUT AGAINST RECIPROCITY

Gleaners Asks All Members To Refrain From Attending State Fair When Taft Speaks, Believing Pact Hurts American Farmers.

Northville, Mich., Sept. 13.—The Gleaners, a farmers' organization here, at a special meeting, passed a resolution asking all members of the local organization to refrain from attending the state fair at Detroit, Sept. 18, for the reason that President Taft would be there that day.

The reason for his action is that the Gleaners regard Taft as responsible for the Canadian reciprocity pact. They think the trade agreement will hurt the American farmer, and they don't want to be at a state fair where he will speak.

The resolutions call upon all the Gleaners of the state to "do likewise."

CHINA ON VERGE OF
A GREAT CIVIL WAR

Situation Similar to the Feudal Wars of Middle Ages.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 12.—In the opinion of students of oriental affairs, China is rapidly approaching a great crisis in her history. The uprising in Szechuen Province is expected to expand to extend to other neighboring ward, where the Mongolian element has for years been opposed to the reigning Manchou dynasty. Evidently prepared for trouble, the Chinese government has been quick to dispatch troops into the affected district and to deal with the situation with a strong hand. It is believed here that the Government will be able to suppress the present disturbance, though the unforeseen disaster of the Yang-Tze Valley is expected to drive thousands of the unfortunate natives, whose means of support have been destroyed, into the ranks of the revolutionaries.

The present situation resembles the great feudal wars of Europe in the Middle Ages. Japan also had to pass through a similar ordeal, and it is believed that the Chinese Government will now put down the revolutionaries.

AIRSHIP MAN
MAY STOP HERE

Western Fair Directors Are Trying to Get J. J. Ward as Attraction.

FLYING FOR \$50,000 NOW

Will Be in Buffalo Today and May Be Induced to Come to This City.

New York, Sept. 12.—James J. Ward started this morning from Governor's Island for his long transcontinental flight from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast. He is flying for a prize of \$50,000 offered by William R. Hearst. Ward started at 9:08 o'clock. His destination this morning and his first scheduled stop was Middletown, N. Y., 60 miles away. From Middletown Ward planned to follow the Erie Railroad to Buffalo. Mechanics with gasoline and extra parts await him at Susquehanna, Pa., where he hopes to spend the night.

Aviator Ward may alight at the Western Fair Grounds on Friday afternoon, covering one leg of his journey from Buffalo to this city.

President W. J. Reid, Col. W. M. Garthshore and W. M. Spencer are now arranging a proposition with his managers to have him alight in this city on his way across the continent.

This morning a wire was received to the effect that Mr. Ward would fly to Buffalo today, and that he would come through Ontario, probably alighting in London.

The Western Fair directors immediately wired particulars of the offer to have him stop at the Fair Grounds, and at the present time are awaiting an answer from him.

"We are in communication with him," said Secretary Hunt. "We wired him a proposition, and he may accept it. I hope he does, as it will add much to the interest of the Fair."
