Murphy on the subject, "How the Roman Catholic Church conducts its Social Work." OIL STOVE COMPANY MAY LOCATE HERE

Representatives Were in London Friday and Looked at Sites.

Representatives of a large coal oil stove manufacturing company of the United States were in London last Friday, and together with Ald. Spittal and Henderson, of the London Board of Trade, they looked over the different factory sites in the city. The company employs 1,400 hands in its American branch, and is seeking a place in Canada to establish a new branch. Before coming to London they had been to Toronto, Montreal, Hamilton and other cities. "They were favorably impressed with London," said Ald. Spittal, "and if I were managing it, I would be willing to bet that their branch will be located here."

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CHRIST GREATEST HERO OF ALL TIME SAYS REV. BROWN

Sunday School Workers in Convention Hear the Chicago Preacher Explain Views on Best Methods of Sunday School Work.

"We have never yet taught the life of Christ in the right way," declared Rev. W. A. Brown, of Chicago, while addressing the convention of Sunday school superintendents, teachers and workers assembled in Wesley Hall of the First Methodist Church on Monday afternoon. "We always preach the sufferings and death of the Saviour, but we never emphasize the heroic qualities he possessed. He was the greatest hero that ever lived, and we do not as yet recognize the fact."

Very Few Realize.

"I have asked scores of people who was the greatest hero who ever lived," said Mr. Brown. "I have invariably got the answer that you yourself have given me, that such characters as Moses, Daniel and David were, and that these would appeal most to young boys. Only one out of every five hundred told me that Jesus Christ is the greatest hero. This character should be taught to the boys and girls in the heroic sense, which is one that will appeal to them."

Wrong Methods of Teaching.

Mr. Brown declared that many of the Sunday school methods of teaching today were wrong, and these mistakes accounted for the failures which occurred in Sunday school life. The greatest trouble was in the grading of the work. Some teachers endeavored to teach the same work to the primary department, while they did to Bible class students, and they retained the same style of teaching with the 5-year-old as was given to the 16 and 17 year old student.

He divided the life of a person into four principal divisions, namely, infancy, childhood, youth and maturity. The cradle roll department included those of the most tender years; childhood was until the age of 12 years; youth or the adolescent period of the person's life, until 20 years was reached, and after that maturity. The two most critical periods were at the ages of 12 and 20. Twelve was crucial on account of its being the dawn of the young manhood or maidenhood, and 20 was significant because it was the entrance into mature life.

How to Retain Interest.

He stated that to retain the interest of the Sunday school a progressive program was necessary at the period of 16. The schools which showed a decrease in their attendance were not accommodating their policy to the present age. New matter and methods must be constantly introduced to revive interest.

Mr. Brown also emphasized the need of graded teaching and careful training for pupils. He was sure that the average scholar of 10 years, coached by good teachers, knew more about the Bible than the average churchgoer, while the 12-year-old student, under the same conditions, was superior in Biblical knowledge to the ordinary theological student.

The speaker stated that lax methods in Sunday school work would have a bad effect on Canada, and if continued would finally lead to the same conditions that the United States was in today.

Should Take Warning.

"You people in Canada are getting ready as we did in the United States a generation ago, to give up your Sabbath for pleasure and then try to regain it," declared Mr. Brown. Rev. W. A. Halpenny, B. D., general secretary of the Ontario Sunday School Association, also gave an instructive address, which dealt chiefly with statistics of the growth or backwardness of Sunday schools in general.

He criticized the London superintendents for not sending annual reports relative to the Sunday school growth to the department. It seems that no school in London had undertaken this work, and thus comparison of London's standing could not be made to other parts of the province.
