He was the greatest hero that ever lived, and we do not as yet recognize the fact."

Very Few Realize.

"I have asked scores of people who was the greatest hero who ever lived," said Mr. Brown. "I have invariably got the answer that you yourself have given me, that such characters as Moses, Daniel and David were, and that these would appeal most to young boys. Only one out of every five hundred tell me that Jesus Christ is the greatest hero. This character should be taught to the boys and girls in the heroic sense, which is one that will appeal to them.'

The speaker contended that the heroic qualities in any man were of fundamental interest to the youth of 12 or 13 years, and that is the character should be appealed to and nurtured. It was by appealing to the senses which aroused the interest of the children. that the greatest good could be accomplished, and if Christ's life was viewed in the corect sense of a hero, considerable ground toward a moral and useful life would be covered.
