In last night's issue of the Cataraci Power-Blackburn journal its twisting turning, evading editorial policy was once more evidenced. On its front page appeared allegations as to The Advertiser's treatment of the reports submitted by "experts" on the London and Port Stanley electrification. The Marshall report upon electrification is so strong and to the point that the Purdom newspaper has refused to print it.

Two days have elapsed since the report was placed in the hands of City Clerk Baker. The report was published in full in the Evening Free Press of Tuesday.

One line from the Marshall report itself has yet to appear in the columns of the Traction interests



#### ARRANT KNAVERY PRACTICED BY THOSE WHO SEEK TO PLUNGE LONDON INTO DEBT BY HIDING THE FACTS AS TO ROAD'S DEBT

City Clerk's Year Book Shows That City Must Pay Interest Annually on \$2,010,186.00, While All Experts Are Made to Believe That Charges To Be Met Are on Only \$765,511—Dishonest and Dishonorable Tactics.

The year book of the city of London ontains the official information of charges on the London and Port Stanley Railway, which has so far been disregarded by every "expert" who has been called upon to make a report.

The statement shows that prior to 1903 the indebtedness on the road amounted to \$765,311, upon which inerest has to be paid. The report continues:
