Some Recipes.

Dear Miss Grey—1. Will you please give me a recipe for maple candy?

2. A recipe for graham bread?

3. Will you also tell me how to make whipped cream?

A.—1. One cup maple sugar, one cup coffee sugar, two-thirds cup of milk. Boil together until it becomes brittle when dropped into cold water. Remove from fire, beat to a creamy state, and pour into buttered tins.

2. To three cups graham flour add a teaspoon of salt, a tablespoon of lard or butter and a tablespoon sugar; dissolve one teaspoon soda in a little sour milk, and add with sour milk enough to make a batter stiff enough to drop from the stirring spoon. Drop in well-greased gem pan, and bake in a quick oven.

3. It is easy enough to whip cream—what bothers most of us is to get the cream to whip! You will get best results by using a wire beater; have the cream very cold before starting to whip. Sweeten to taste, and flavor, if desired, with lemon or vanilla.

Escalloped Salmon.

Dear Miss Grey—Having read your valuable page very often, I thought I would write you for a little information.

1. Can you please give me the song of "The Old Wooden Rocker"? I would like very much to have it.

2. Please give me a recipe for escalloped salmon.

3. Please tell me the proper way to sew on some fasteners.

A.—1. Is anyone familiar with the words of this song?

2. Remove all bones from salmon and break into small pieces; put a layer into a pudding dish, then a layer of cracker or breadcrumb, and season with pepper and salt. Continue until you have used all the fish then pour over all a cream sauce made by rubbing together a tablespoon of butter and one of flour with two cups of milk; let the sauce boil before pouring it on the fish. Dot the top with bits of butter and crumbs and bake for about twenty minutes.

3. I know of no other way than to sew through the tiny holes near the edge. Care must be taken to have the reverse side exactly match the socket. If it does not, you will have trouble in fastening.

For Lonely Country Girl.

A.—In the first place, I think you are wrong not to make more of a confidante of your stepmother. No doubt if you had always done so, she would now be able to offer you sympathy and advice much more to the point than a stranger can give.

Dear Miss Grey: I am sending you the recipe of crumb cake: One-half cup flour, 1 cup butter, 1 cup B. sugar, 1 tablespoon vanilla, pinch of salt. Work this part together with hands till it gets into crumbs. Keep out 1 cup for top; to the rest add 1 cup sour milk, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 cup currants, 1 of raisins; add more flour if it's not stiff enough. Bake in a moderate oven.
