OREGON LOSES ARM.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Gen. Obregon, Carrara's commander in the fight against Villa and Leon, lost his right arm and narrowly escaped death by a shell while directing operations on the firing line. Consul Sullivan reported from Vera Cruz several days ago, it was rumored Gen. Obregon was wounded, and it was confirmed today in an official dispatch to the Carranza agency here.

British Hero of Four Campaigns Dies Friendless

Sergt. Fred Fenton Fought in India, Abyssinia and Northwest. WINDSOR, June 10.—For more than 60 years a British soldier, and with four brilliant campaigns behind him the possessor of more than half a dozen medals, one of them for distinguished conduct on the field in India, Sergt. Fred Fenton, broken in health, penniless and practically homeless, died at the Home for the Friendless here today. He was 83 years old.

GERMANS ARE PREPARING FOR MORE VANDALISM

Look for an Excuse to Bombard Historic Italian Cathedrals. ROME (via Paris), June 10.—11:15 p.m.—An official note issued today categorically denounces a statement attributed to the Berlin Vossische Zeitung stating that wireless plants had been erected and anti-aeroplane guns mounted on the Milan cathedral and St. Mary's in Venice. The note adds: "The announcement seems to have been made to prepare public opinion for attacks similar to those at Rheims and Louvain, but such attacks will be absolutely unjustifiable and alike contrary to the laws of war concerning bombardments of the most elementary principles of civilization."

GERMAN ATTITUDE INSULT, SAYS ROUMANIA MINISTER

LONDON, June 10, 8:15 p.m., via Paris, June 10.—1:15 a.m.—The Tribune's Bucharest correspondent sends the following interview with M. Falesco, former Rumanian Minister of War: "Some weeks ago it was in our power to eliminate all our difficulties and place ourselves on the map as greater Rumania. I hope it may be so tomorrow, but I have serious fears."

ALLIES FIND BENZINE MEANT FOR FOE'S SUBS

ROME (via Paris), June 10.—11:55 p.m.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Athens says: "The Allies have discovered at a lonely part of the coast near Kalimo (an island off the southwest coast of Asia Minor), 1500 cases and 95 barrels of benzine, with which it was intended to replenish the tanks of German submarines operating in the Dardanelles region. It is supposed the benzine was shipped from Saloniki to Piraeus as kerosene and sent from there to Kalimo."
