British Labor Is Requested To Follow Same Course in Resolution Passed by Trades and Labor Council of Manitoba's Capital-Pledge Is Taken To Continue Fight For Strike Leader's Freedom.

Winnipeg, Jan. 31 .-- At last night's session of the trades and labor council a resolution was adopted, calling on all workers to strike to enforce the release of R. B. Russell, convicted of sedition, and British labor was asked to do the same. Support of the Labor Defence League in its continued efforts to obtain Russell's release was also pledged on the assertion that he was being deprived of freedom for a fight for the rights of labor.

Viscount Grey Points Out the Reasons for Empire Maintaining Firm Attitude.

FOSTER FRIENDLINESS

Constitutional Questions Are Reasons For U. S. Objection to League.
