

STECKER DEFEATS SZBYSZKO IN A HARD BOUT

Brave Out of Toe Hold To Take Fall After One Hour and 32 Minutes of Wrestling.

BOSTON, Feb. 12.—Joe Stecker, the world's champion heavyweight wrestler, successfully defended his title here tonight by defeating Wladek Szbyszko, whom he downed in 1 hour, 32 minutes and 30 seconds. The fall was made by a full body scissors and wrist lock.

Stecker, while reeling under Szbyszko's attack, secured the hold that resulted in the fall. For five minutes before he had been held in a toe hold after he had gripped Szbyszko for an equal length of time with a head lock. Stecker used principally the head lock and scissors, while Szbyszko relied upon the toe hold.
