

General Manager of English Railway Appointed by Order-in-Council.

MERGE FEDERAL LINES

Government Names Eight New Directors of Canadian National Railway System.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4 .- (By Canadian Press) .- Major-General Sir Henry Thornton, K.B.E. general manager of the Great Eastern Railway of England, is the new head of the Canadian National Railways. An order-in-council appointing him and the other members of the board, and formally creating the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Lines into the Canadian National Railway system passed cabinet council today, and was approved by the acting governor-general this evening. Sir Henry arrived in Ottawa this

morning, and final arrangements for his appointment were then made. He leaves again tomorrow for New York, and will return almost at once to England to settle up his affairs there, returning to Canada to take over the direction of the National Railway System within about a

A contract was signed this afternoon, extending over three years, unper annum. Clauses in the contract it was stated, give protection to the government and to the new president and general manager of the railways, in the event of either side wishing to terminate the agreement before the end of three years.

The resignations of the existing board of directors of the Grand Trunk System were accepted by the government today, and the new board was appointed to administer the joint system. 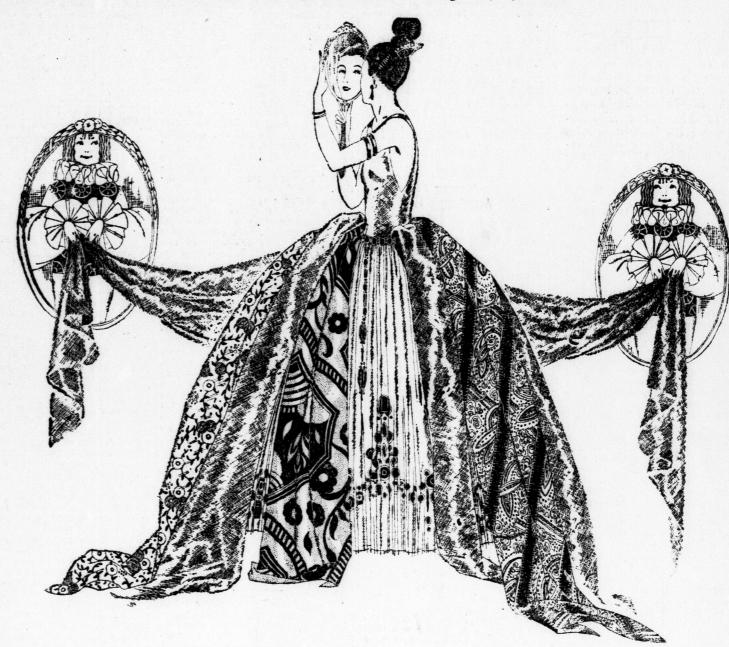
