The Greek charge d'affaires in this city denies that King George has intimated his intention of accepting the demands of the Powers, as stated yesterday in a despatch to a Greek merchant in this city. This bears out the report by the Athens correspondent of the Times in an interview with M. Delepannes, the Greek Premier, yesterday, in which he said that Greece's decision to maintain her army in Crete was irrevocable, but that the troops would abstain from the offensive. They would only protect the Christians. Greece would not declare war against Turkey unless the Turks invaded Thessaly or the Powers rendered the position of Greek troops in Crete unbearable.

THE LIBERAL VIEW. The Manchester Guardian, speaking in behalf of the Liberals, says it has no objection to the scheme for granting autonomy to the Island, but it strongly objects to the Greek troops being compelled to withdraw before the Turks. Sir Wm.
