CARDINAL BOURNE ON ENGLISH

Says Canada May Unite Englishmen in His Church Service.

London, Eng., Aug. 6.—Cardinal Bourne, Archbishop of Westminster, delivering his presidential address at the Roman Catholic Conference of Great Britain, in session here, said he doubted whether England could claim pre-eminence in the work of the evangelization of the world by means of the English speech.

It was to Canada they looked, he said, for the link that would unite all Englishmen in the service of the Church. Canada already possessed the ancient traditions of the Church in France, so closely united to the Church in England. Removed from the civil control of France when that control might have proved fatal both to faith and morals, the French-Canadians had under another rule preserved to themselves the liberty of worship, freedom of religious government and possibilities of intellectual culture, such as had been enjoyed by Catholics to the same degree in no other part of the British Empire.

The Canada of to-day was not the Canada of even a very few years ago said the eminent prelate. Religion alone would make a nation great, and the Catholic religion had this unifying force.

BIG PAPER MILL FOR NORTH SHORE PROPOSED

Contemplated Project—Power From Nipisiquit—Successor to Mr. Melanson on Public Utilities Commission to be Appointed.

St. John, Aug. 5.—Premier Fleming, who, in company with Mrs. Fleming, was in the city on a visit on Friday, was asked about the reports of a large pulp and paper industry to be established at Grand Falls, and he characterized the project as an excellent one and said it would prove a big boon for the province.

"This is not the only paper mill that is likely to be built in the province, through," said Hon. Mr. Fleming. "While in Bathurst recently I had a talk with Mr. McLean, a prominent lumber merchant, and he informed me that there was a possibility of his firm erecting a paper mill. They plan on harnessing the Grand Falls at Nipisiquit, where there is a possibility of generating a large amount of horse power. This would enable them to turn out 100 tons of paper a day. Another excellent feature in the establishment of such an industry would be the utilizing of a large amount of lumber, thereby benefiting that industry."

The Premier said that at a meeting of the local government to be held in Fredericton on next Tuesday, a successor to O. M. Melanson, M. P. P., on the Public Utilities Commission would be appointed and the farm settlement board would also be organized.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said he was hopeful of having a conference held on the redistribution question in Ottawa previous to the sitting of the next parliament. He and Mrs. Fleming left for their home by the Boston express last evening.

THE ROYAL PARTY IN CAPE BRETON

Steel Plant at Sydney Visited.

Sydney, N. S. Aug. 5.—Leaving the Earl Grey shortly before ten o'clock this morning, His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and the male members of his party were conveyed by the motor launch to the Steel Company's pier. There they landed, and accompanied by Mr. D. H. Plummer, president of the company, made a trip through the works. Her Royal Highness the Duchess, Princess Patricia and the ladies of the party were driven to the southern end of the plant, where they were met by the other half of the party. A special train was waiting there, and, boarding that, the vice-regal party left shortly after eleven o'clock for Glace Bay. There an address of welcome was read by Mayor McDonald, after which the party continued on the trip to Louisburg. Arriving there, another address of welcome was presented by the Mayor, and the party were taken for a visit to the old town. They are expected to arrive in Sydney again about four o'clock this afternoon.

ORDER OF THE HOLY REDEEMER IN CANADA

New Province to be Established.

Considerable changes of interest are taking place in the Holy Redeemer Order, since the Redemptorists have been in Canada they have been under the jurisdiction of the Baltimore Province.
