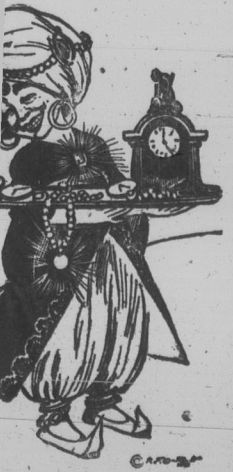

WILL VOTE ON NEW BUILDING

Ratepayers Will be Asked to
Authorize Issue of
Debentures

A meeting of the town council was
held Tuesday evening with Deputy Mayor
Devereaux in the chair and Councillors,
Bissett, Matthews, Ingram, McKay
and Campbell present.

Minutes of previous meeting were
read and confirmed.

A communication was read from Mr.
Alex. McLennan making application
for a three inch water service pipe for
the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital. Re-
ferred to Water and Sewerage Com-
mittee with power to act.

The town clerk reported that he had
been advised that the Town of Camp-
bellton had been allotted \$100,000 un-
der the Government's Housing Scheme,
also that the agreement to let entered
into had been forwarded here. So
far the agreement had not arrived. He
had already called the government's
attention to this and felt that within
a day or two the agreement would be
here. No action was taken the coun-
cil feeling the agreement under which
the money would be advanced should
first be before the council.

Two communications were read from
accounting firms in reply to enquiries
from them regarding a system of ac-
counting for the Town of Campbellton.
These were from Belyea & McNish,
Moncton, and Jones, Weston & John-
son of St. John. Laid on table.

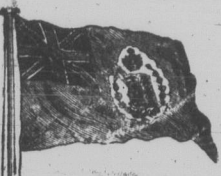
The usual monthly accounts were
ordered paid.

Councillor Ingram reported that he
had seen Mr. W. F. Yorston with refer-
ence to arranging a meeting to dis-
cuss opening a street through Mr.
Yorston's property. Mr. Yorston was
willing to meet the Council's commit-
tee at any time convenient to them.

The question of the erection of a
combination building as a town hall
and fire station was then taken up.
Councillor Matthews from the Fire
Committee reported that he had re-
ceived an offer from Mr. Edward Sul-
livan for the purchase of his building
on Water Street the price asked be-
ing \$15,000. He thought that an ex-
penditure of about \$20,000 would be all
that would be required to alter the
building to suit the town's needs.

Councillor McKay enquired if it was
felt that proper provision could be
made to house the fire horses therein
without the usual smell from housing
such animals permeating the building.
Councillor Matthews said he thought
it was.

After much discussion it was finally
decided to call a vote of the citizens on
Monday next when two propositions
would be submitted for their approval.



PEACE DAY PROCLAMATION

Saturday, July 19th, (first)
having been officially proclaimed a
Public Holiday throughout the
British Empire, for the celebra-
tion of peace, the citizens of
Campbellton are hereby request-
ed to observe that day as such,
in a manner befitting the occa-
sion, by the display of flags and
bunting throughout the town and
the simultaneous ringing of
bells and the blowing of whistles
for a period of five minutes, com-
mencing at 12 o'clock noon on
that day; also by any other form
of procedure that may be agreed
upon between the citizens and
the civic authorities.

DEMONSTRATION AT DALHOUSIE

Shire Town Will Hold Peace
Celebration On Saturday—
The Program.

Dalhousie, July 16.—Saturday, July
19th, having been proclaimed a gen-
eral public holiday by His Excellency
the Governor-General-in-Council, to
celebrate the signing of the Peace
Treaty, the citizens of the shiretown
are preparing to celebrate the day
with all pomp possible.

Capt. John R. Doherty, speaking in
the name of our Dalhousie returned
soldiers, has informed your corres-
pondent that the following program-
me will be carried out on Saturday.
At 2 o'clock p.m. the Parade will start
from the Gallop skating rink, going up
Loggie's corner, and coming east on Ade-
laide Street, etc. The Parade will be
headed by a Bugle, Fife and Drum
Band. Immediately following the
Parade, there will be a programme of
sports carried out in the large rink,
for which prizes will be presented by
His Worship Mayor Montgomery, the
prizes having been donated by gen-
erous citizens. A canteen will be
kept open all day in the Rink and be-
tween 5 o'clock and 6 o'clock supper
will be served in St. Mary's Hall. In
the evening there will be a dance,
given in the Dalhousie Athletic Club
Rooms, and fireworks from the top
of the Hill. All returned soldiers, in
the centre and lower end of the county
are to be invited to attend.

Of course every person is expected
to do something, to make the day a
grand success. Every flag available
in the town should be seen flying to
the breeze on Saturday.

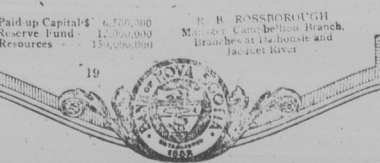
