This article read: "The owner of a motor vehicle for which a certificate is issued under this section, shall be held responsible for any violation thereof or of any regulation provided thereunder by order of the distenant-Governor in Council; and shall be responsible for all accidents or damages caused by his motor vehicle upon a highway or public square."
