



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

### Writing Reform

A reform for which there is a crying de mand is a reform in the written character of our speech. This is a rapid age and ther is not one of our daily acts against which our feverish souls so hotly rebel as agains the labor of writing. Surely here is a fittin field for one who is at once a philanthropi and an inventive genius. Brevity is th prime consideration, but legibility mu ust be strong second. In our present mode o writing legibility has been lost sight of alto gether. In ordinary writing it / i usually possible to keep matters straigh rence to the context sense of an article, but it i notorious that names, in newspaper more especially, are constantly misspelled In the haste of writing for the press it i found impossible to devote the time for "painting" the letters, which is the only way of ensuring accuracy. Theoretically "o and "r," "u" and "n," "v" and "r," "m" an "in," "a" and "o," "y" and "g," "b" and "h are quite unlike and distinct. We know however, that in practice they do get sadiy confused and mixed, especially in the case of names. Indeed these remarks were suggest ed by reading in a great New York paper list of persons present at a meeting in which scarcely a name but was disguised beyond recognition. Now, what is required is a se of characters so distinctly differentiated th an ordinary careful man writing rapidin would have a chance of getting his word printed the way he spells them.

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
