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# LONDON BUSINESS INTERESTS

## IRON OUTPUT WAS LOWER IN AUGUST

Total Shows Decline of 4,000 Tons Over July Figures.  
**RECORD IN STEEL**  
Production in Canada Highest Since November Last.

The quantity of pig iron and ferro-alloys produced in Canada during the month of August was nearly 4,000 tons lower than that of the previous month. Pig iron made by the firms for their own use dropped about 10 per cent., of 5,828 tons below last month's figures. The output of basic iron was considerably higher, being 46,939 tons, as compared with 40,720 tons in July. Foundry iron production decreased from 10,239 tons in July, to 1,882 tons in August. This decrease was entirely in that which was made for the use of the producing firms. Malleable iron also declined during this month, none of the firms reporting any of this product as being made for their own use, while 1,234 tons was made for sale. There was but a slight falling off in the output of electric iron castings; last month's total of 105 tons being lessened by 4 tons. Pig iron made for sale during August amounted to 3,207 tons, which was an increase of 1,888 tons over that of July.

The reports for this month show that there were 2,547 tons of pig iron produced. There is included in this amount 94 tons which was sold, this being the first sale of pig iron reported since February. The several grades of ferro-silicon totaled 97 tons for August, as compared with 659 tons during the previous month, a gain of 562 tons. The Algonia Steel Corporation reported only two blast furnaces in operation at the end of the month, one having been blown out during the period. This loss leaves a total of five furnaces operating and 15 idle at the end of August. The blast furnaces active were as follows: Two at Sault Ste. Marie, one at Hamilton and two at Sydney.

This month's production of steel ingots and castings, totaling 72,023 long tons, is the highest since November, 1920, being nearly 10,000 tons more than the amount produced in June, the previous record month of this year. The output of steel ingots showed an increase of 25 per cent., or 15,640 tons over that of last month. Basic open-hearth steel accounted for the increase, this month's total being 70,088 tons, as compared with 52,111 tons in July, of which was made by producing firms for further use in their own plants. There was a falling off in the output of electric steel ingots, 248 tons being produced in August, as against 523 tons in July.

The production of direct steel castings during August amounted to 1,514 tons, which was an increase of 347 tons over July's total. Basic open-hearth steel castings continued the advance made in July by rising to a higher total, 770 tons being produced, as compared with 630 tons in July and 389 tons in June. The quantity produced for sale was 483 tons this month and 445 tons last month, while that made for further use totaled 287 tons in August and only 185 tons in July. Electric steel castings increased 204 tons, the total for the month being 812 tons, and for last month 608 tons.

Converter steel castings produced during the month amounted to 102 tons, three tons more than last month's total. The small percentage, 6 per cent., (six tons) was made for further use in the producing firms, while the balance, 96 tons, was made for sale.

The record production of steel during the current month raises the average monthly production from 50,000 tons to nearly 52,000 tons. The average for the first four months of the present year was 45,000 tons, while that for May, June, July and August is 25 per cent. higher, or 60,000 tons. It will be noted by examining Table 4 (b) that the greatest production of steel during the first eight months of 1920 occurred in August.

**DOMINION WOOL MARKET.**  
As a result of general buying activity in Europe, Britain, United States and Canada, there has been a tendency on the part of sellers to advance wool prices. Buyers, on the other hand, although apparently willing to meet the old level of values have been slow to meet the new prices asked and sales have been slow, except on offerings which have remained at former quotations. The evident shortage of this year's cotton crop and the already appreciable advance in prices for British tops and yarns are creating a strong undertone to wool prices and it would appear only a matter of time until buyers will have to meet the prices asked by sellers.

**DESTROYER ASHORE.**  
BOSTON, Sept. 30.—The coastguard cutter Aconet was ordered out from Woods Hole to-day to the assistance of a naval vessel, described in radiograms as the naval ship Bagaduce, reported ashore on the east end of Fishers' Island, off New London, Conn. The Bagaduce, last reported at New London, is listed in United States naval records as a destroyer.

## INDUSTRIAL PROSPERITY IS GRAYLY RETURNING; NO RIMES ON THE WAY

**Improvement Steady Though Not Hopefulness**  
Industrial prosperity is returning, but there are no signs of a boom. The situation is one of steady improvement, but not of hopefulness. The burden of local taxation, another factor which it was stated would do much toward improving the situation, would be a stabilizer of the raw material market, and it also being said that a readjustment of freight rates to a more normal basis would be of material assistance.

Real prosperity will return, the answers to the questions declared, when farm, ranch and mineral products can be sold again for at least the cost of their production; when railroads can be operated on freight rates low enough to permit shippers to sell their merchandise at a profit; when labor, generally speaking, again will do a maximum day's work in full co-operation with employers on a readjusted wage; when readjusted retail commodity prices permit wage earners to live comfortably on such readjusted wages, and when the post-war unemployed class finds and settles down into permanent usefulness.

Seven reasons for optimism were mentioned by merchants, banks and manufacturers in their answers, as follows: Money is much easier during the last two years, the reserve ratio is steadily increasing, labor difficulties in some states seem to be decreasing and the workingmen seem to be ready to co-operate in readjustment, the probable favorable outcome of the coming disarmament conference, the hopeful possibility of a reduction in the national-wide economy policy of the Government, corporations and the general public, the possibility that farmers and stockmen may be able to get good terms of the products on good terms this autumn and that they will liquidate their debts.

**UPSETS THE LAW ON CHILD LABOR**  
United States Federal Court Declares It Unconstitutional.  
**NO FEDERAL CONTROL.**  
Judge Holds Labor Is Regulated By Different States.  
At the United States federal court at Greensboro, North Carolina, on August 22, Judge James E. Boyd declared unconstitutional the law which has been in force since 1915, imposing a federal tax of 10 per cent. on the net profits derived from the operations of firms employing child labor. The provisions of this act were designated to take the place of an earlier law, passed in September, 1916, which had also been declared by the same judge to be unconstitutional. The opinion, in this case, was delivered by the Supreme Court of the United States. The judge's decision is one of the powers retained by the several states and not delegated to the Federal Government. State child labor laws, he held, may provide a penalty, though not a tax, such as was imposed under the federal act, but on one appeal against a federal act was issued next day by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, with a demand that the decision be sustained that Congress devise some other method of preventing child labor. Members of the executive council claimed that this law, which virtually abolished child labor in the Southern States. The 10 per cent. tax was imposed on the profits of (a) any mine or quarry in the United States in which children under 16 have been employed during the taxable year; or (b) any mill, cannery, workshop, factory or manufacturing establishment in which children under 14 years of age have been employed or permitted to work, or children between the ages of 14 and 16 years have worked more than eight hours a day, or after the hour of 7 p. m., or before 6 a. m. The Vivian Spinning Mills, of Cherrydale, N. C., asked for an order of court restraining the collector of inland revenue from enforcing the act at their plant, with the result outlined.

**NEW MOVEMENT AIMS AT SLAUGHTER OF CATS**  
TORONTO, Sept. 30.—The Provincial Board of Health has received a circular from a cat extermination movement whose headquarters are in Chicago. The reasons given for urging "a catless world by 1935" is that the cats spread disease and also kill thousands of song birds every year. Rewards are offered for cats killed.

## ORDER FOR JAPAN FILLED IN LONDON

The Corston Company Working On Special Pipe Order.

**WILL MAKE HUGE SKYLIGHT.**  
Largest Construction of That Kind Reaching Completion.

The largest metal skylight ever constructed in the City of London is now under way in the shop of the Corston Company, successors to Foster & Corston, metal contractors, 74 Fullarton Street. This skylight, which is 25 feet square, will be installed on the roof of the new Collegiate School, the Corston Company having awarded the contract for all the metal work on that building.

Known as Foster & Corston this firm, though in business but a short time, soon forged to a prominent place in the front ranks of London's sheet metal workers and contractors. Quite recently W. M. Corston, who had been previously associated with the firm as a partner, took over the whole business himself and it is now known as The Corston Company.

Not only locally has the firm acquired an enviable reputation, but specimens of the work it turns out have journeyed to Japan and have given such satisfaction that repeat orders have resulted. The Japanese orders consist of the necessary hoppers and pipes used in connection with a coal pulverizing plant. The Japanese firm which is installing the plant uses a very fine coal under its boilers and the material sent out by the London firm is used in pulverizing the coal to the necessary fineness. This is the second installation of the kind the Corston Company has made for Japanese concerns, which speaks well for the quality of the firm's output.

Another line of metal working in which the concern has specialized with much success is the manufacture of automobile bodies. On the occasion of a recent order the bare chassis was left in the shop and the firm was instructed to build a body for it along certain general lines. The result was a splendid job. The car was turned out of any factory and in consequence of this success other orders of a similar character have followed suit. The firm pays particular attention to special orders or unusual executions for work of any kind in the line of sheet metal.
