## TWENTY-FOUR KILLED.

**Fearful Wreck on the Boston and Main Railroad, in Vermont.**

White River Junction, V. T., Sept. 16. A fearful head-on collision between the southbound Quebec express and a north-bound freight train on the Concord division on the Boston and Maine railroad, occurred four miles north of Canaan station early Sunday, due to a mistake in a train despatcher's order, and from a demolished passenger coach there were taken out 24 dead and dying and 27 other passengers, most of them seriously wounded. Nearly all of those who were in the death car were returning from a fair at Sherbrooke, Que., 160 miles north.

The accident was due to a misunderstanding between J. A. Crowley, the despatcher at Concord, who has been in the service seven years, and John Greeley, the night operator at Canaan, who has seen 27 years' service in transmitting orders. One of these two men made the fatal error of taking a cipher for a four, and thereby giving the conductor to understand that he had plenty of time to reach siding.
