The following account of the sad fatality that befel George Watson, is taken from the Kinderley, Sask., Clarion:—"A sad fatality occurred last Sunday morning at 8 a.m., six miles west of Alsask, when George Watson, a fireman on the C. N. R. was instantly killed. The engine was backing up when seven box cars and the engine left the track. The engineer warned Watson to hold fast to the engine, but he jumped and rolled down the embankment. He was just in the act of climbing up when the tender turned turtle, pinning Mr. Watson under. It is reported that death was instantaneous. An inquest was held over the body at Alsask, where Coroner Clemens performed a post mortem examination, the jury bringing in a verdict of accidental death. Mr. Watson was well and favorably known around Kinderley, and his many friends were affected when they heard of his sad end. His body was shipped to Watford, Ont., for burial, leaving Alsask on Tuesday morning."

Park Reunion

The Deseret (Utah) News gives an account of the Park family reunion at Provo at which 125 descendants of John and Louise Smith Park were present. The report says:—"After dinner a program was rendered consisting of remarks from the senior members of the family, reminiscent of the past experience of their parents. Their journey was traced from Watford, by the aid of photos of the old village streets of Watford, one of which is still called Mormon lane. Down this street three of the Park brothers drove their ox teams in 1846, enroute for Winter Quarters, camping on to Utah with the pioneers in 1849."

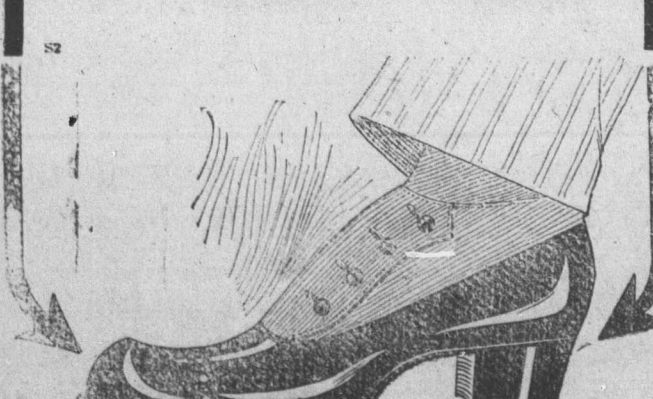
