## OUR CHEESE FACTORIES

Statement of the Business Done the Past Season.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AUDITORS.

MAPLE GROVE FACTORY.  
To the Patrons of the Maple Grove Cheese Factory:—

GENTLEMEN.—In tendering once more our annual report, we would say that at no time have we found the factory in a better working state than in the season past. We have erected a new factory with every facility for the better manufacture and keeping of the cheese, surpassed by none in the west, together with employees careful and energetic. In the past year there are some things to be regretted; first, the low state of the cheese market, but over this there was no control; second, that in the latter part of the season this benefit did not reach but part of our milk, but we are endeavoring to remedy this. We would also remark that on account of the low price of cheese, the rate of manufacture is reduced for four months of the season below the price agreed upon. Below will be found an abstract of milk, cheese, and money paid:

MAY.—Milk received at factory, 77,110 lbs.; cheese made, 7,010 lbs.; cash paid patrons, \$289.10; dividend, 37c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 64c. per lb.

JUNE.—Milk received, 153,824 lbs.; cheese made, 14,348; cash paid patrons, \$769.15; dividend, 50c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 74c. per lb.

JULY.—Milk received, 164,444 lbs.; cheese made, 14,196; cash paid patrons, \$707.00; dividend, 43c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 74c. per lb.

AUGUST.—Milk received, 163,802 lbs.; cheese made, 15,422; cash paid patrons, \$704.99; dividend, 55c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 84c. per lb.

SEPTEMBER.—Milk received, 132,611 lbs.; cheese made, 13,100 lbs.; cash paid patrons, \$967.32; dividend, 73c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 94 and 10c. per lb.

OCTOBER.—Milk received, 88,998 lbs.; cheese made, 9,250 lbs.; cash paid patrons, \$710.58; dividend, 80c. per 100 lbs. milk; charge for making, 2c. per lb.; cheese sold for 10c. per lb.

Total amount of milk received at the factory for the year 1885, 780,789 lbs.; cheese made, 73,320 lbs.; cash paid patrons, \$4,354.22.

NOVEMBER.—Milk received, 18,927 lbs.; cheese made, 2,152 lbs.; cash paid patrons, \$160.52; dividend, 88c.; making, 2c.; cheese sold for 10c.
