Apple Creps Will be Large But Not Good.

A Halifax man who is closely in touch with the apple producing and shipping interests of Nova Scotia, says that after careful enquiry, and after driving through the great orchard districts of the province, he has concluded that the apple crop this year will be fully as large as that of last, which was a phenomenal one. He says, however, that while the quantity of apples will be fully equal to that of 1903, the quality this year will be much inferior as to appearance at least. The fruit is spotted and lacks the beautiful purity of color that marked last year's crop. This and the fact that the apple growing regions have large crops this year will, he beliaves, take a dollar off the price that will be realized in England as compared with the figures of a year ago.


