UNITED FRUIT COMPANIES' PRESIDENTS' ADDRESS

Delivered at Kentville, Nova Scotia, at the Fifth Annual Meeting in June, 1917 In bidding you welcome to this our fifth annual meeting of the United Fruit Companies, of Nova Scotla Limited, I want to call your attention to the present status of agriculture in the world.

Since last June the United States of America has been drawn into this military whirlpool, while several more nations are likely to follow in the near future. No matter how great the cost, no matter how terrible the loss, no matter how high the sacrifice, Democracy must win, and the freedom, and liberty of all peoples must be secured ere the sword is returned to its scabbard, or the deathly lively a cores to fix.


