REV. J. ALEXANDER, of Noval, sailed last week for a three months' trip in Europe.

The opinion of the congregation of Cooke's church, city, as to the desirability of the use of hymns, having been sought by the Session, a vote was taken by ballot, whereupon it was found that the vote for hymns was 202; against, 112.

REV. JAMES V. JOHNSON, missionary of the Church of Scotland, who had filled the pulpit of St. John's Kirk, 5 Clarendon (N. S.) church with much acceptance, was recently waited upon by a number of the congregation and presented with a purse of money and an address as tokens of their esteem.

The Presbytery of Montreal will meet in Crescent street church on Sabbath, the 23rd of June, at 8.15 p.m., to ordain three missionaries for the Foreign Mission field. Their names are Murdoch Mackenzie, Jno. H. MacVicar, B.A., and John Macdougall, B.A.—all graduates of this year of the Presbyterian College, Montreal. Their destination is Honan, China. Dr. Wardrop, Convener of the F. M. C., Dr. MacVicar, Dr. Mackay, Revs. D. W. Morrison, James Fleck, L. H. Jordan, B.A., are to take part in the ordination service.

ADVANTAGE was taken of the presence of a large number of Gaelic-speaking ministers at the General Assembly to have a Gaelic sermon preached to the Highlanders in the city. Accordingly, a goodly number gathered last Sabbath in the lecture-room of Knox church to hear Rev. Adam MacQueen, of Ripley, discourse in the vernacular of the Gael. The reverend gentleman selected Hebrew iv. 16, for his text, and delivered an excellent sermon. An announcement was made that another sermon in the same language might be expected in the same place on Sabbath next.

The Sunday school scholars of Knox, Etobicoke, and St. Andrew's churches, city, were massed in the body of Knox church Sabbath afternoon. Fully eight hundred children were present, and they certainly presented a most unique and interesting congregation. The infant classes occupied the front seats, and behind them were arranged the older scholars, according to their size, the teachers of each class occupying the head of the seat. Brief addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Bryson, of Alabama; Rev. J. W. Fleck, of Montreal; Dr. Moore, of Ottawa; and Mr. W. B. McMurrich.

H. Land (the inventor), of Detroit, Mich., and Dr. H. H. Hopkins, of Toronto, Ont. Thus the question: What do you think of the porcelain filling for the teeth? I answer because it is the most fully in accord with the physical law of our being, in its freedom from all thermal and electric influences, as compared with any of the metallic substances now in use, which in my forty odd years' experience have proved a source of much and protracted shocks of pain from heat and cold, which too often resulted in the death of the tooth pulp (commonly called the nerve), and from the position of its decomposition follow inflammation, suppuration, and too often (from a root of decay) use are left behind which in the most painful extraction. Hence I say, because the most perfect filling, to say nothing of its degree in the restorative and healthy, in the blending of colour and restoring the natural appearance, in which I am fully convinced it combined utility, beauty, comfort, and durability, thus in the true interest of all who love order.

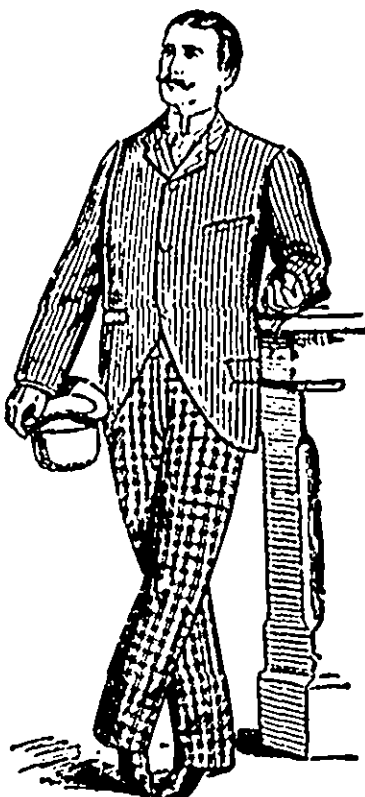
