There is some later intelligence of the revolution in Spain. The outbreak in Madrid, so evident, was premature, altho it appears to have been well concerted up to the latest minute. It is somewhat difficult to determine, with the information before us, whether or not Espartero is concerned in it. The vigor of O'Donnell had put down the insurrection in the capital, after thirty hours hard fighting with the insurgents, in which 200 were killed. Espartero it appears had returned to his own house where he was under arrest but there seems to be no mitigating circumstances in his conduct. His name is however connected with the insurrection in Saragossa, where the insurgents have gained a victory over the garrison, and where it is said the Cortes had assembled, and proclaimed Liberty and the Constitution. A French force was ordered to the frontier, and the friends of Queen Christina were bestirring themselves in her favour.

DEATH BY LIGHTNING.—On the 18th inst. Mrs. Jane Wilbur, wife of Mr. James Wilbur, of New Horton, Albert, went into the fields to pick strawberries. About 4 o'clock, p. m., there arose a terrific storm of thunder and lightning. Night came on, yet the wife and the mother did not return to her husband and family. At length the neighbours went in search of her, and there beneath some apple trees where she had gone for shelter from the storm, by the lightning's glare they discovered her body horribly disfigured by the destructive element. The tin vessel she carried was partially transmuted, the part remaining was riddled with holes, as tho' a charge of shot had been fired through it. Her bonnet was found in tatters at the top of one of the trees which was rent in pieces. Her clothes were literally burned to a cinder, and the ground around the spot bore evident marks of the terrific force of this subtle agent. At midnight her body was borne to the household of the late David Wilbur. On Monday the 21st, she was consigned to her last resting place—her funeral being attended by a sorrowful multitude. A funeral sermon was preached by Rev. J. A. Marshall, from John 11th, 35v.—Christian Visitor, St. John, N. B.
