ASYLUM REVELATIONS IN NEW YORK.

ALBANY, April 30.—The assembly committee which investigated the affairs of the Utica insane asylum presented a report this morning. The committee concluded that Evin D. Hughes received his injuries at the hands of attendants, Brown Weir and Bills, and that one of these is personally responsible for his death. The committee find that the attendants treated the patients with great roughness and at times with cruelty and brutality, and that the patient Heath died within a few days after his ribs had been broken by the attendant Beece. There is an understand-ing among the attendants, that there would be no complaints against each other for infraction of the rules. The committee recommend the establishment of a school for attendants and higher rates of pay. They say the evidence is convincing that Miss Lathrop was suffering under a delusion when she made the charge that outrages had been committed in the asglum. They also recommend the appointment of one woman physician. The asylum committee think the management of the institution is loose and that a radical change is necessary and that Dr. Gray spent a considerable time away; from the institutlor
