Mr. James Cathbertson, of the Town hall, Bristol, sowed three pounds of Lodoga wheat, got from the Experimental farm, last spring, and he thrashed i the other day 221 pounds of plump wheat as a product. The seed was sown in a field alongside other wheat and the ground had not been prepared in any extra way for its reception.

The Huntingdon Gleaner reviews the harvest situation as follows: The fine weather of the past ten days practically wound up the harvest. There are late sown fields yet out, but the quantity is small. The showery weather entailed some loss, and farmers who had overripe or cut grain out in the rain lost two or three seedings by shelling, majority, however, secured their crops in good order and without any loss. We hear nothing but good reports from those who have threshed, and on the c'ay land it is safe to say oats will; run from 40 to 50 bushels to the acre. We have met farmers who claim a yield or 60 bushels, and in Tullochgorum we are told 60 bushels is the rule. The grain is plump and bright, as indeed all kinds are, the only excep-tion being peas in some parts of the country, from not filling properly. Wheat is some in quality and of such good return, that the regret is more was not sown. The potato for continues to spread, and farmers are inclined to begin inting now, the experience of last year having shown that potatoes dug the first week of September were saved, while those that got the fall rains were lest.
