379-345, which approves the dumping of toxic mine tailings into Alice Arm Inlet, in northern British Columbia, and calls for a full public inquiry into the issue.

Members know that I have raised this issue on previous occasions. Many groups are concerned about the possible effects these mine tailings will have on the environment and especially the damage the tailings will do to the Nishga's traditional fishing grounds. Five major church groups have endorsed this petition, as have labour unions, environmental groups and public representatives. The petition is 380 pages long and has been signed by 9,000 Canadians. This clearly reflects the concern Canadians have about this problem and I urge the government to respect the request and hold a full public inquiry into this issue.
