It is with great pleasure that I now inform your Society of the erection of a handsome and commodious Parsonage for this Mission. The work was begun early in July, and pushed on with great vigor by the contractor ever since, so that the building is now completed and ready for occupation. It is a balloon-framed cottage, cased outside with brick, of Gothic style, and after the model of, though rather smaller than the Kingsey Parsonage. About \$350 of the debt incurred will be paid this year, and by the end of next, we hope with outside help, to nearly clear off the balance.

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We have, as usual, collected for the various objects of your Society, and also, as will be seen by the financial statement, for some outside of it. I think that the total of such offerings is not much below what it was last year, though a falling off might naturally, perhaps, be expected, on account of the great local call upon our resources in building a Parsonage.
