N. Y. GOVERNOR FAVORS RACING

But Sulzer Says Gambling Element Must Be Eliminated
—To Start in May.

NEW YORK SUN: Formal notice of the long expected revival of racing on the New York tracks came from Jockey Club headquarters yesterday. Meetings at three big tracks—Belmont Park, Aqueduct and Saratoga, will be held. Belmont Park Day, May 30, with a rolling on Decoration will be the first. Aqueduct will have three days a week—until July 5. Jamaica will extend until Aug. 10. The same plan, Saratoga, will race daily for four weeks, until Aug. 10. And after that, the racing will be held at the Empire City Aqueduct. Jamaica and Belmont Park will race in the fall.

It was learned some time ago that racing would be resumed under the recent Scudder decision, affirming the appellate Division of the Supreme Court and overruling the lower court's decision. It was believed at first that the appeals would follow Belmont Park, but the formal decision was not expected until the unknown reason, as the Empire City track will be used by the trotters and by the colts. On July 1, was intended to conduct a running meet there during the summer.

Under the Scudder decision eminent attorneys have advised the racing interests that they can sue the State for prosecution for alleged violations of the so-called directors' liability law. The law is a measure of protection between individuals, the laying or odds, the acceptance of a wager which may be made by the bettor.

Not long ago it is said that two prominent racing men, including one on Gov. Sulzer at Albany and explained the plans for a renewal of the sport. According to the Albany Journal, Gov. Sulzer informed the turfmen that so long

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead's patent) and cultivate the land.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a new one, may pre-empt a quarter-section homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead six months in each of five years and erect a house worth \$300.00.
