

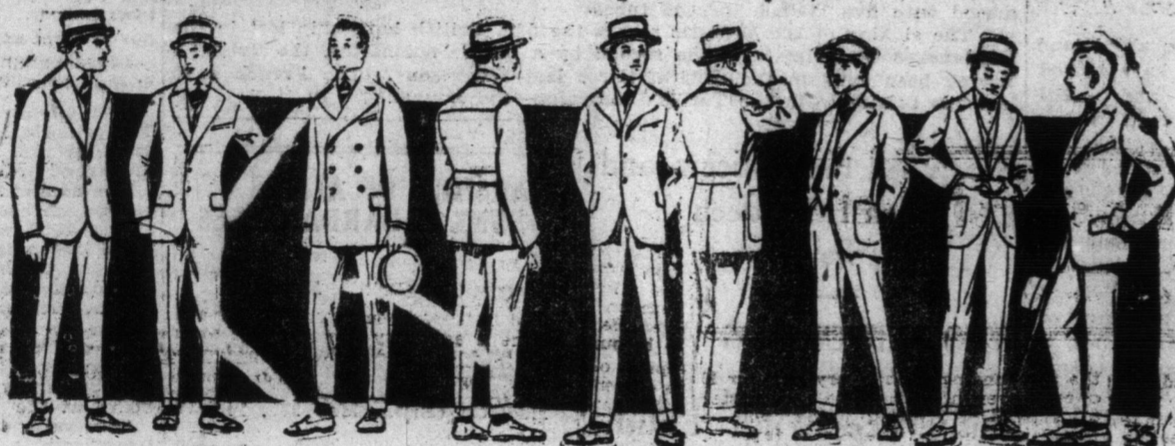

### NEW TODMORDEN SCHOOL OPENED

Ceremony Was Performed by School Inspector Campbell Last Night.

### LARGE ATTENDANCE

Education Great Problem to Deal With, Said Reeve of York.

One of the finest public schools in the Dominion was opened last night in Todmorden by School Inspector M. Campbell, in the presence of a large assembly. H. H. Frankland, a past trustee, occupied the chair, and those on the platform included George S. Henry, M.L.A.; F. Miller, W. Graham, Robert Barker and Charles McKay of the township council, P. W. Lindsay and Robert Hazelton.

The new school, which is situated on Torrens avenue, just east of Pape avenue, has twelve rooms, with accommodation for 600 pupils, and the cost of land and buildings will exceed \$100,000. It stands upon two and a half acres of land, so that ample provision has been made for open air recreation. With the exception of the desks, no wood has been used in the construction of the building, which is claimed to be absolutely fireproof. The brick used in the building is similar to that of which the new General Hospital is built. The kindergarten rooms are of the most up-to-date type, being made of a specially prepared cement, into which the coloring has been mixed. The school was opened for inspection at 8.30, and from that hour till 1 o'clock it was thronged with people.

Tribute to Trustees.—In declaring the school open Public Inspector Campbell paid a tribute to the trustees and those who had to do with the building of the school. He stated that the school had been built in accordance with all regulations, and was one of the finest in the province.

George S. Henry, M.L.A., congratulated the trustees and ratepayers on the completion of the school, which was superior in every respect to any other school in the county. He pointed out that the position which the British now held in the world was the result of the educational facilities which have been afforded in the past and for which money is being so lavishly expended at the present time.

William Burgess, secretary-treasurer of the board, stated that the trustees had had a strenuous time during the past year providing accommodation for the rapidly increasing number of pupils, and that the school had been established in the district. He stated that the assessment of the school in which the school is located was \$2,400.00.

Hard Problem.—Thomas Griffith, Reeve of York Township, after congratulating the board on the work accomplished, said that the township council had no harder problem to cope with than that of education. In connection with the controversy concerning the insurance of township schools, the reeve stated that at the last session of the county council a committee had been appointed in this regard, which had decided that it would not be advisable to sink a large sum in insurance. He was of the opinion that at the June session a sum would be set aside for all dependents of men killed in action and those disabled. The county failed in this Mr. Griffith assured the gathering that the township would do all that was necessary in looking after the disabled and dependents. Addresses were also made by Rev. A. A. Bryant, Rev. D. D. Francis, Hartman Jones, the principal of the school; Robert Hazelton, W. A. Clarke and H. H. Ball.

### THE MASONRY WORK

Complete Contract Was Carried Out by the Firm of Holby, Brothers, Limited.

The complete contract for the erection of the school has been carried out in a highly satisfactory manner by the well-known local firm of Holby Brothers, Limited, and is of fireproof construction throughout. Masonry work was commenced early in July of last year, and the building was advanced to such a stage that the work of other trades could be carried on during the winter months, thus furnishing employment during the winter months and allowing for the early completion of the building this spring.

The exterior of the building is in Easton or tapestry brick with effective designs in ornamental brickwork, which give a pleasing appearance and serve to illustrate the possibilities of brick as a building material.

The structural portion of the interior is of steel, terra cotta and concrete finished in such a manner that wood is entirely eliminated, while the decorative and artistic effects are preserved in such manner as to make it a model building for school purposes.

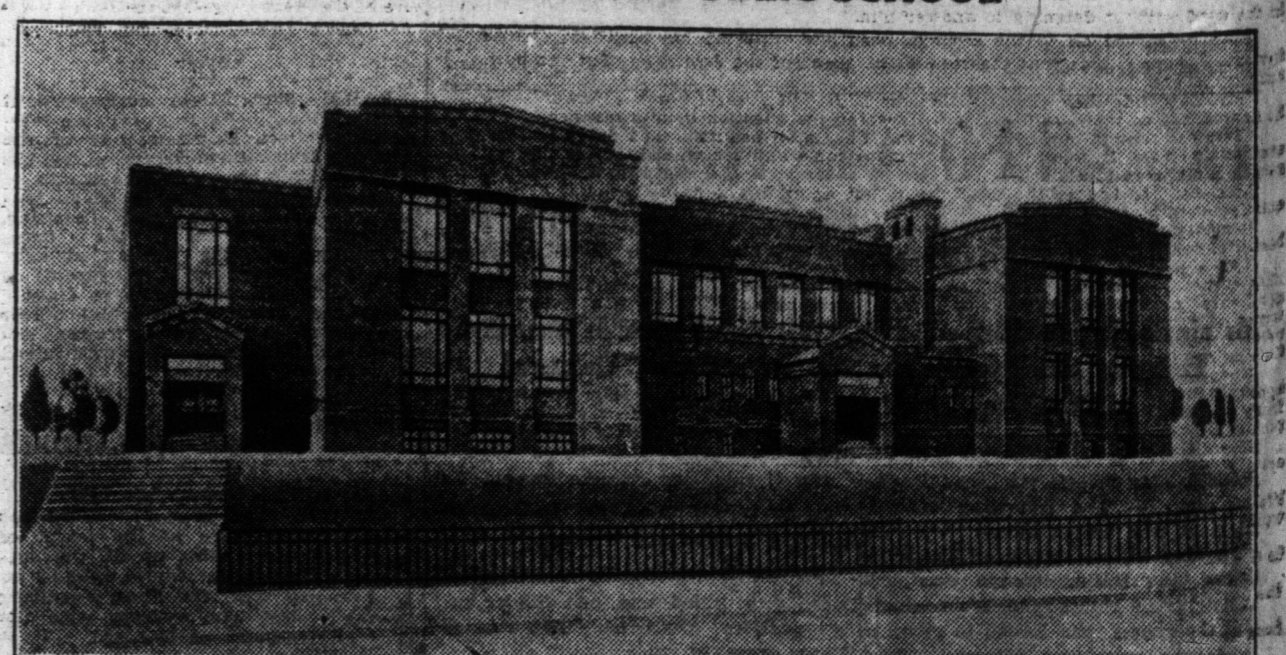

### FIRE PROTECTION IN BEDFORD PARK

Serious Charges Made Against System at Meeting of Ratepayers.

That the fire protection of Bedford Park was wholly inefficient, that the lives of 200 school children in Bedford Park School would be in jeopardy in the case of fire, and that the hose supplied was two inches too small to connect with the hydrants, were some of the startling charges made by a member of the Bedford Park Ratepayers' Association, at a meeting of the association, held in the schoolhouse there last night. It was further alleged that Captain Murphy of the North Toronto Fire Brigade would not allow the Bedford Park station to be apprised of grass fires, reserving the runs for local men, and that the northern men did not receive the necessary drill.

Deferred Action.—The chair was occupied by President Rowley, and the attendance was fair. Further action was deferred pending the visit of a representative of the Underwriters' Association next week.

The association expressed disapproval of the proposal of the new private motor bus company to charge ten cents from the C. E. R. tracks to Bedford Park, and wrote the Metropolitan Railway, asking for the best rates and timetables possible.

The meeting also expressed its disapproval of the action of Ald. Risk in failing to support the association's action for better playgrounds, and will take upon itself the question of interviewing the playgrounds committee.
